

ST. PAUL WINS TEACHERS MEET

Convention Winds Up Affairs Today—Majority of Educators On Junketing Trips—Mrs. Ella Flagg Young Given Credit for Victory.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 14.—With a dozen departmental sessions scheduled today but with a majority of the teachers scattered on various pleasure and sightseeing trips, the delegates of the National Educational association convention are preparing to close up business tonight with a general session.

Among the final events of the week's festivities are the numerous receptions which are being held today at the Palace and St. Francis hotels and other centers throughout the city. The result of the election of the entire progressive ticket, headed by President Carrol G. Pease of Milwaukee, and Miss Katherine D. Blake of New York as treasurer, and a majority of the vice presidents and directors-elect, today emphasizes the power of Mrs. Ella Flagg Young and the progressives are generally attributing their victory largely to her.

The new board of directors chose St. Paul as the next convention city.

SISKIYOU COUNTY WET AFTER TRYING PROHIBITION

The supervisors of Siskiyou county on Saturday adopted a resolution declaring that they would pass an ordinance at the meeting to be held July 17, repealing the present dry ordinance and throwing the county open to saloons.

The action is taken as a result of failure of jurors to bring in verdicts of conviction under the present ordinance. It is declared that liquor is sold at numerous places in the county. The supervisors propose to have the county really dry or else make it legally wet. High license, strict regulation and a cash bond will be features of the new ordinance.

GUILTY OF ELOPING WITH ANOTHER'S WIFE

SALEM, Ore., July 13.—It took the jury just ten minutes to return a verdict of guilty in the case of the state versus Betchen today. Betchen was charged with eloping from Nebraska with the wife of Newton Rubie and living unlawfully with her in Marion county, Oregon. He was arrested several months ago on a farm near Mount Angel. The defense failed to introduce any evidence but sought to clear the man by setting up legal technicalities.

This is the second time Betchen has been convicted on this charge. He will be sentenced Monday.

CLOSER RELATIONS FOR STATE AND NATIONAL BANKS

OAKLAND, Cal., July 14.—State and national bank examiners and clearing house representatives of the eleventh national bank district of the United States convened today at the Claremont Country club for a joint conference under the auspices of the national treasury department.

It is expected that closer relations between those engaged in the supervision of both state and national banks on the Pacific coast will be established a result of the conference.

A Hint From Paris



WHILE STRAW HAT WOULD BECOME FAVORITE

REPORT PROGRESS UPON DESERT LAND SCHEMES

SALEM, Ore., July 14.—After an eight-day tour of inspection of the various irrigation projects in the state the members of the state land board and the state desert land board have returned. The first stop made by the party was Klamath Falls, and from there they proceeded to Lakeview. Its mission to this place was two-fold—an inspection of members of the desert land board of a project in the north end of Warner valley, and an examination by members of the state board of lands owned by the Warner Valley Stock company and about which the company is in litigation with the state. An effort is being made to compromise the dispute and the merits of the compromise were carefully gone into.

From Lakeview the party went to Paisley, and here the members were surprised to find about 12,000 acres of land, subject to irrigation, which is held up, and has been for a number of years because of the inability of a Portland concern to carry out a contract with the state under the Carey act. The settlers are anxious to have the land restored to entry so they may appropriate it under the dry farming laws.

At the Anna river the project the party found several steam-shovels and dredges at work constructing canals for irrigating 31,000 acres of land, and at Bend they looked over the canals of the Central Oregon Irrigation company, which are now serving to irrigate 60,000 acres of land.

FRENCH LAWMAKERS WANT THE "REST" ALSO

PARIS, July 14.—"La Depeches," of Toulouse, in urging the cause of higher pay for French lawmakers who receive \$3000 a year and much criticism for paying themselves as well, declares that congressmen in the United States receive \$7000 a year and "gratification of their least enterprise"—towels, nightshirts, toilet articles, perfume "and probably the rest as Lafontaine says." This last, of course refers to women.

HOT SPELL IN NEW YORK OVER

Temperature Modified but City Still Suffering From Effect of Blistering Heat That Has Prevailed for Many Days—Hardship On Poor.

NEW YORK, July 14.—Temperatures are somewhat modified in New York today but the city is still suffering from the effects of the blistering heat that has prevailed for many days. It is believed, however, that the hot spell is virtually over. In the congested tenement districts of the east side and in other sections of the city there is still much suffering among the poor. Many deaths, that occurred among the poorer classes today can be attributed to the extremely hot weather the city has experienced for the past two weeks. The shortage of ice continues and is causing much distress in households where there are small children.

SAFE TO LAND FROM WRECK UP TO NOON

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 14.—"Transfer passengers to some suitable vessel or allow them to remain on board at their own risk," was the first message I received," said Barney Frankel, wireless operator on board the Santa Rosa, testifying before the federal board of inquiry. "This message came about 10 a. m."

Besides Frankel's testimony the most important evidence was furnished by Fourth Mate T. L. Mathison who said that in his opinion as a seaman it would have been safe to land boats or transfer the passengers at any time up to noon.

BOOKER T. FAILS TO APPEAR IN ASSAULT CASE

NEW YORK, July 14.—When the case of Booker T. Washington against AlRichard Ulrich for assault was called for trial here today neither the educator nor the man who pummeled him for alleged annoyance of his wife appeared and the case was put at the bottom of the calendar. This means that it will not be reached until October.
