POLICE HAVING AN EASY TIME

During Past Five Days No One Has Been Locked Up—Town Is Well Behaved and No One Makes Trouble.

Whether it is the hot weather or not, which is to blame, the Medford police are having an easy time. For five days there has been a dearth of drunks and petty offenders and no one has been locked up.

Following the Fourth of July for two or three days the police were busy but since then they have had plenty of time to rest. The town is very well behaved indeed.

THREATENED TO STOP BUILDING

There was a great craning of necks and squinting along the front of the handsome new First National bank building Friday morning when it became noised about that it was a few inches out in the street. There was a great discussion of the matter, and the crowd grew larger and larger until it looked like a mass meeting.

As a matter of fact, the ornamental stone front is six inches over the property line to a height of five feet above the sidewalk. At this point the main front is set in on the line, in fact a half inch back of the line. In erecting the building the architect followed a custom prevalent in most cities which allows ornamental work or steps to project into a street, the sidewalk, of course, being considered a part of the street.

Mrs. Doubleday who owned the Miles block claimed that the projection of the building interfered with the view of a show window in her block. She threatened court proceedings but the matter is reported to have been adjusted.

As a matter of fact, other buildings in this city are in the same condition, and building ordinances in nearly all cities permit ornamental projections. Medford has no ordinance governing the subject.

SLEEPS EIGHT DAYS AFTER AUTO ACCIDENT

SACRAMENTO, Cal., July 14.—George Smith, manager of a local printing establishment, is today still unconscious due to injuries received in an automobile accident here eight days ago. Smith was lying asleep in the tonneau at the time of the accident. Physicians here are puzzled today over the patient's condition, as a trepanning operation which was performed has had no noticeable results.
