

CITY FIXING UP OLD WATER PLANT

Force of Men at Work Making City Property On Riverside Presentable—Old Well Will Probably Be Filled In.

Superintendent Tranna of the city water works, has men at work overhauling, tearing down and building new the old pumping plant station on South Riverside avenue.

The city owns several lots there and for several years the grounds have been a catch-all for the city water system. This is all now being changed. Carpenters are removing the surplus buildings recovering those needful and to be retained, the old motors, pumps, engines and boilers are being dismantled and placed in shape to be offered for sale. The grounds are being leveled off for convenience in handling new material and the place generally is beginning to take on an appearance in keeping with the slogan, "Medford, the City Beautiful."

But while all these improvements are going on the old well, fully 50 feet deep and 20 or more feet across and filled nearly to overflowing with Bear creek water, is still in evidence. A hole in the ground to the memory of Medford's outgrown water system.

As there cannot be any possible chance for this well to ever again be of use to the city it will be filled up. There are sure enough germs lurking around that old hole in the ground well being of the community.

DEATH AGAIN FRIGHTENS LEA

Having Saved His Wife's Life by a Transfusion of Blood, Senator Lea of Tennessee, Would Save Her From Pneumonia.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 15.—Having saved his wife's life recently through the transfusion of his own blood into her veins, United States Senator Luke Lea of Tennessee today is racing westward against death which now threatens Mrs. Lea from pneumonia.

While there pneumonia attacked Mrs. Lea and a physician told the senator the only way to save his wife's life was to get her to a dry climate. Lea at once put his wife aboard a special train and rushed westward. Today they are somewhere in Colorado.

DEFENSE HARD AT WORK ON CASE

Now That McNamara Case Is Set for Trial Attorneys Have Hard Work Ahead of Them to Get Ready for Action.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 15.—Now that the McNamara case is actually set for trial, the attorneys for the defense of the accused union men today settled down to earnest work in preparation for the legal battle. They say that to get the case ready for October 10, will require the hardest and most persistent endeavor.

Not only will the 5000 pages of the transcript of evidence have to be gone through and classified, but trips will have to be made all over the country, to Chicago, to Indiana, to Wisconsin, to San Francisco and to many other points where different phases of the case lead and many witnesses summoned.

It is unlikely that there will be further legal steps taken before the actual commencement of the trial.

The first thing to absorb the attention of the attorneys for the defense will be the selection of jurymen. A venire will be drawn prior to October 10 and it is anticipated that the selection of the jury will take fully a month. It required that length of time in the Haywood trial and Attorney Darrow states that the McNamara case is probably better known among the people than the famous Idaho case.

AMERICANS ARE NOT HARD BOOZERS

Statistics Show Americans Only Drink 16.5 Gallons of Beer Apiece—Fifth in Line With Use of Spirits—French Lead All With Wine.

LONDON, July 15.—The English revenue department has been investigating the capacity for drink possessed by the people of the various countries from which it has been able to get statistics and it finds a number of quite interesting things.

Germany, for instance, is not the greatest beer-drinking country in the world, as might have been expected. Belgium holds the record, with 46 gallons per capita per annum, to Germany's 22 gallons. Bavaria, however, taken separately from the rest of Germany, beats even Belgium, with 50.6 gallons. As a whole, Germany is not even second on the list. Englishmen drink 26.2 gallons apiece. The United States record is only 16.5 gallons, or less than either Belgium, England, Germany or Denmark.

As drinkers of spirits, Americans rank after Denmark, Germany, Holland, Austria and France, being tied with Sweden at 1.14 gallons apiece. As wine drinkers the French lead the world, with 34.5 gallons.

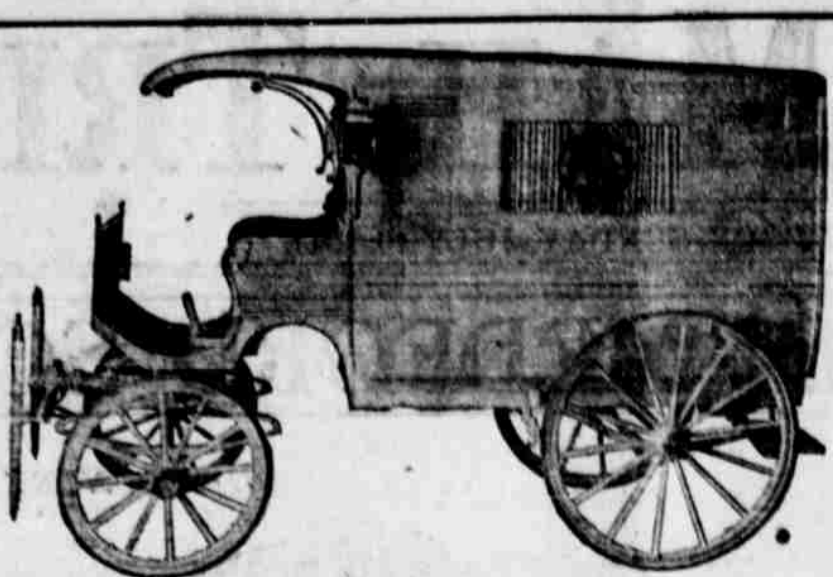
