MINING CONGRESS OPENS TUESDAY

Delegations of Mining Men From All Sections of the West Will Attend—Many Matters of Interest Are to Be Discussed.

GRANTS PASS, Or., July 17.—Southern Oregon and northern California mining congress will convene in this city tomorrow for a session of two days and will be attended by a large delegation of mining men from over the west. A special feature of the meeting is an extensive mineral display, representing ores from many mines of southern Oregon and northern California.

An exhibit of gold nuggets from Josephine county placer mines represents many thousands of dollars in value and is a glistening display. The program includes technical papers by mining engineers and mining geologists, and an address will also be delivered by Professor J. S. Diller of the United States geological survey, who is here to make surveys of the mining districts of Josephine county.

Mining men began to arrive this morning and report that attendance from their respective districts will be large. Portland and Seattle will be represented by wide awake men; New Mexico by Professor Fayette A. Jones, E. M., L. L. D. and Colorado by the Cripple Creek country.

The congress will probably vote favorably on a proposition to annex to the American Mining congress.

MASS MEETING HELD TONIGHT

Plans for Holding Pear Show and District Fair Will Be Gone Over at Meeting of Business Men of the City This Evening.

A mass meeting of the business men of the city will be held this evening in the rooms recently vacated by the Emporium in the Miles block for the purpose of making plans for the holding of a pear show and district fair in this city this fall. All are urged to attend.

DOG FAITHFUL THO' STARVING

BEND, Or., July 17.—Guarded by a starving dog, which for seven months watched over the dead body of its master, the remains of John Parker, a trapper, have just been found in his cabin in the mountains 50 miles west of here, by a searching party.

The dog had eaten every scrap of leather and rubbish about the place, but starvation could not lure the faithful animal from its post. The searching party found the dog a mere hulk of skin and bones. Parker came here from Auburn, Wash.

GREEK PROBABLY WILL RECOVER

Man Shot Saturday Night Rests Easily Today at Local Hospital—Officers Are On Trail of Would-be Murderer.

In all probability Peter Ruchias the greek who was shot at the railroad camp near Butte Falls Saturday evening by Peter Janetos a fellow countryman will live. He is resting more comfortably today at the hospital in this city and the chances are in favor of his recovery.

In the meantime the officers are on the trail of Janetos and it is believed that they will capture him in the near future as it is deemed impossible for him to get out of the country. Saturday night after he had fled panic stricken he returned to the camp and changed his clothes and then again disappeared. Deputy Sheriff Clevenger and Constable August Singler are after him.

It has developed that Ruchias has been more or less of a bully about the camp and has made several enemies. Janetos is said to be but a boy and that Ruchias' taunts drove him to desperation. Finally he was goaded too far and turning on Ruchias, shot him.

NOTED PASTORS PREACH HERE

Ministers From Eastern Cities Fill Various Pulpits in Medford and Delight Local Church Goers—Churches Filled Despite Heat.

Medford church people were given a rare treat Sunday when they were permitted to listen to several splendid sermons by some of the most prominent ministers in the United States. Of these clergymen there were Rev. William Baird Craig, pastor of the Christian church in New York City; Rev. A. M. Haggard, of Des Moines, Ia., and Rev. G. W. Grafton of Kansas City, Mo. These gentlemen preached to good sized audiences in the various churches of the city and despite the extreme heat every utterance of these distinguished men was attentively listened to.

These reverend gentlemen were returning east from attendance at a convention of the workers in the Christian churches of the United States, recently held in Portland. They were accompanied by their wives, who, also are prominent workers in Christian organization in the east.

Rev. Craig preached in the M. E. church Sunday evening and his closing remarks upon universal brotherhood were the most eloquent appeals to all Protestant churches for a universal Christ-like religion and faith ever uttered from a Medford pulpit.
