ALBANIAN INSURRECTION IS SPREADING RAPIDLY

VIENNA, July 18.—With death and desolation on all sides, the Albanian insurrection is spreading rapidly, 6,000 insurgents today being in the field and 200,000 of their countrymen preparing to take up the struggle against the pitiless domination of the Turks.

American aid is the Albanians' only hope of freedom, according to Ismail Kemal Bey, chief of the Albanian "freedom or death" committee, who is now in Vienna on the first lap of a journey through Europe to endeavor to arouse public sentiment against the Turkish outrages.

ITALY'S COASTWISE SHIPPING SUFFERS; DUE TO CHOLERA

NAPLES, via Paris, July 18.—Italy's coastwise trade is greatly hampered and her foreign shipping is practically at a standstill today as the result of the cholera epidemic in most of the Mediterranean ports. The populace is greatly excited and refuses to aid the authorities in their efforts to stamp out the disease.

One of the gravest dangers is that, as a result of the quarantines established, the labor organizations are proposing a general strike. Should this threat develop into fact, it is probable that the disorder resulting would further cripple the hands of the authorities, while the assembling of crowds would almost certainly contribute to the rapid spread of the disease.

SALEM, Or., July 18.—Governor West has announced the appointment of R. O. Stevenson of Forest Grove, a democrat, as judge of Washington county, to succeed the late Judge J. W. Sewell. Mr. Stevenson is former game warden of Oregon.
