Ice formations weighing thousands of tons are sliding down the mountain-side and thundering over the high cliffs into the river below. The river has not in this generation had the color it has at present. Ordinarily during the summer months it has a milky white appearance, but now it has a pink hue. Many citizens of the valley have gone to the mountain to witness the strange behavior of the glaciers. The large glacier slides are rapidly carried away by the wild stream and dissolved by the heat as they pass down.
