"TWO WOMEN AND A MAN"—MURDER

Police Go Back Four Years In an Endeavor to Find Cause for Murder of Banker's Wife—Banker Is Now Under Arrest.

RICHMOND, Va., July 21.—"Two women and a man"—the old, old story—today was given here as the solution of the mysterious murder of Mrs. Louis Beattie, jr., who was killed by a shotgun as she rode with her husband in an automobile over the Midlothian pike near here.

The detectives went back four years to find the woman in the case. They discovered that Beulah Binford, a brunette beauty and school-days sweetheart of Beattie, was, according to Henrico County, the mother of Beattie's first born son, now dead.

Last night a dozen sleuths sweated the Binford woman on Seherer's farm nine miles from here, to which place she had been spirited from Richmond.

The clue to the woman was given when witnesses to Beattie's wedding remembered that when a mysterious veiled woman appeared and sat in a rear pew of the little Manchester church while the ceremony was performed.

Questioned during her examination last night, the Binford woman is said by the police to have admitted that she was the mother of Beattie's dead son, born July 24, 1909, and that she had received money from Beattie to remain away from Richmond.

At the inquest this afternoon Beattie will be confronted by the woman. Lacking evidence of murder, the police are endeavoring to trace the ownership of the shotgun with which Mrs. Beattie was killed.

A DYING INSTITUTION.

NO American fete, or carnival seems to be complete without imitation royalty created out of tinfoil for the occasion, for Americans dearly love a throne, even if it is a fake one.

The various mardi-gras and festivals all have their carnival kings and queens whose duty for a day is to head processions, lead grand marches, mumble fol-de-rol, wear gaudy medieval costumes, just like the real article.

Portland's rose carnival has its Rex Oregonius—a king, just as the little dinky country fairs have their queens, only in the latter the people vote for their favorite at so much per vote to secure needed funds, while a secret clique confers the rather dubious honor in the former instance.

But Seattle has gone both one better. It is giving a "golden potlatch." A potlatch is an Indian feast, the giver of which bestows gifts upon his tribe. Of course there is a king for the potlatch. There is also a whole court full of nobles, including grand dukes. Surely a delightful combination—an Alaska Digger feast, presided over by fandel English monarchs and Russian nobility!

What a caricature upon royalty! How depressing it must be to the thoughtful monarch like King George, whose duties, after all, are simply a perpetual round of carnival reigns. The growing democracy has ruthlessly stripped the once mighty institution of royalty of its dignity, power and sacredness and reduced it to a parade figure head. As such it may be a useful institution, for snobs must have a throne to fawn about, and the human circus a central figure for its holiday.

THE CHANGED OREGONIAN.

WHILE the leopard cannot change his spots or the Ethiopian his skin, a greater change than either has come about in the Portland Oregonian—for that great journal has reversed its former policy and is now friendly to other sections of the state—and actually lending a helping hand.

It is with much pleasure that Medford people notes the changed attitude. Time was, and not so long ago, that the Oregonian seemed to think no good could come out of Medford, and acted accordingly. Seldom was the city and its achievements mentioned, never in a complimentary vein.

All this has changed. The Oregonian now has only kind words for Southern Oregon, the Rogue River Valley and Medford in particular. Several editorials the Mail Tribune has reprinted, one of them today, reflects the changed attitude.

It is the fate of most newspaper chiefs to work without recognition outside their offices. It is but right that the people of Southern Oregon should know that the change in the Oregonian's attitude is due to its editor, Edgar B. Piper, who guides that journal's policy, although his name does not adorn the columns.

Unlike his great predecessor, Mr. Piper has seen the Rogue River Valley as well as other sections of the state and intends to see more of it, and while the Oregonian may lack the sting and venom that made it famous in days of old, it is broader, in its views and fairer in its treatment, and a better newspaper for the people of Oregon.

Mr. Piper will visit Crater Lake the latter part of the month. When he does, the attention that his position merits, and that his courtesy deserves, should be shown him. In him, Crater Lake will have a powerful friend, one who can help where help is needed.

WARM WEATHER KILLS MANY FISH

Water in Tributary Creeks of Willamette Becomes Heated and Speckled Beauties Die—Large Pools Lined With Dying Fish.

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., July 21.—Thousands of fish in the Willamette river have been killed by the hot weather of the past two weeks, according to anglers who returned from a fishing expedition into the headwaters of the stream today. Water in creeks tributary to the river, into which the fish had gone, have become heated by the sun's rays, as to kill the finny tribes. Large pools, the banks of which are solidly lined with dying fish, were found by the party.
