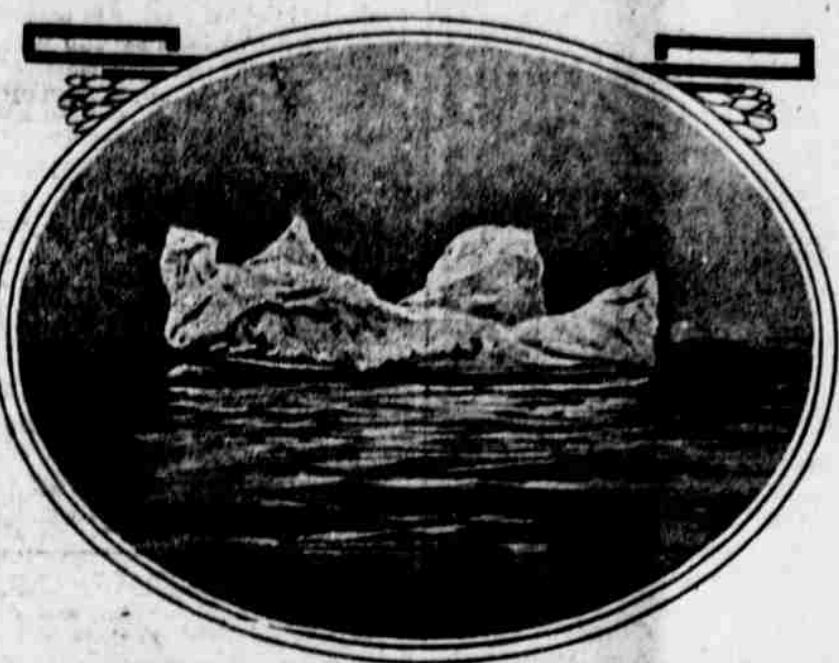

LAWYERS MEET SOON REVISE WORK

Commission of Seven Lawyers, One of Whom is A. E. Reames, Will Begin Early in August to Change Procedure in Oregon Courts.

In two weeks a most important commission of which A. E. Reames of this city is a member, which is "to prepare a revision of the jurisdiction of courts and practice and procedure therein," will meet in the hall of representatives in the state house to organize and begin its work. This commission consists of S. T. Richardson, Salem, chairman; Will M. Peterson, Pendleton; R. R. Butler, Condon; S. M. Garland, Lebanon; A. E. Reames, Medford; A. E. Clark, Portland, and Thomas O'Day, Portland.

The last legislature considered this commission necessary on account of the recent radical change in the constitution of the state relating to the judiciary, district attorneys, clerks, sheriffs and jurors. All of section seven of the constitution, fixing the present judicial system and establishing all county offices, was swept away by the constitutional amendment adopted through the initiative at the last election, and in its place is found a short, concise amendment which makes every existing court in the state, excepting the supreme court, and every sheriff, district attorney or other county officer, subject to the legislature instead of being fixed by the constitution as heretofore.

LED SOCIETY; WAS DOMESTIC; KILLED

Woman, Formerly Wife of Multi-Millionaire, Has Worked for Years as Domestic—Stepped in Front of Automobile and Is Killed.

CHICAGO, Ill., July 21.—Killed here when she stepped in front of a speeding automobile, "Mrs. Catherine Porter," 52, a domestic in the home of W. F. Hobbs, was identified today as Mrs. Catherine Edgar, the divorced wife of Selwyn C. Edgar, a multi-millionaire steel manufacturer of St. Louis.

A heavy veil worn by the woman on the streets to prevent her friends of other days from recognizing her was the cause of her death. It obscured her view and she did not see the flying automobile until it was upon her.

Twenty years ago Mrs. Edgar was a leader of St. Louis society. Her husband was rich, and they had a 2-year-old son. Then came domestic trouble and divorce. Too poor to seek aid from her relatives, the former society queen sought menial work to provide for herself. Finally she came to Chicago, where she married a man named Porter, but whether he is living or dead is not known.

As "Mrs. Porter" the dead woman worked in the Hobbs home for five years. She had no friends and sought solitude. Once she told her employers that her son, Sullivan Edgar, was a wealthy manufacturer in St. Louis, and though she wrote to him frequently, she never dared to permit herself to return to the scene of her triumphs and sorrows.
