

# WEST SAYS HIS POLICY'S RIGHT

### Governor Believes in Extending Helping Hand to Under Dog—is Not Letting Loose a Lot of Hardened Criminals.

PORTLAND, Or., July 21.—The remarks of Governor West in his address before the Portland Ad club at its weekly luncheon on the subject of prison reform are being discussed with interest here today.

"I am going on with this work and make it win," the governor is quoted as saying. He then denounced the criticism of the state press and of individuals, of his methods in handling inmates of the state penitentiary.

"I believe in extending a helping hand to the under dog," Governor West continued. "Three-fourths of the young fellows sent to the penitentiary are not really criminals at heart. Just because I have a policy of letting these boys out on parole or putting them to work, I am accused of letting loose a lot of hardened criminals to commit further depredations. This is not true. My policy is right.

"The world is better today than it ever has been and is growing better right along. If I can do anything in my humble way to help the poor fellows who have gotten into trouble I am going to do it."
