

MRS. M'MANIGAL BREAKS DOWN

Nervous Strain Too Great for Woman and She is Taken to the Hospital Suffering From Partial Paralysis.

LOS ANGELES, July 22.—Suffering from nervous prostration and partial paralysis of the lower limbs, Mrs. Ortie E. McManigal, wife of the self-confessed dynamiter, was taken today to the Pacific hospital for treatment.

A bulletin issued from the hospital before noon said that it was likely that Mrs. McManigal would suffer the loss of the use of her lower limbs and possibly would be permanently paralyzed. According to John F. Tyrell, an attorney who has been Mrs. McManigal's bodyguard since her arrival here, her condition is the direct result of the espionage system kept on her by Burns' detectives, who have followed her every movement day and night. Even the precincts of her home, Tyrell said, were hunted by Burns' sleuths, disguised as book agents and peddlers. So far was this espionage carried that two detectives in an automobile followed Mrs. McManigal to the hospital.

Last Thursday District Attorney John D. Fredericks ordered that all surveillance over Mrs. McManigal should cease. This order, said Tyrell was violated by the Burns detectives.

SIMON LOSING HIS HOLD IN HAYTI

Minister Cables That End of Present Government is Near—Fear Loot and Rapine When Rebels Enter Capital.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 22.—Cable despatches from United States Minister Furniss at Port Au Prince to the state department today say that the end of the present Haytian government is near. He says that the diplomatic representatives of the powers are anxiously awaiting the arrival of United States warships, fearing that loot and rapine will follow the entrance of the rebels into the city.

The treasury of the republic, he says, is empty and President Simon's hold in power is slipping hourly.

Minister Furniss reports that the gunboat Petrel today is en route to Gonaives to ascertain the situation there and the gunboat Peoria is due at Port Au Prince this afternoon from San Juan.

Robber Sent Up for Life.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 22.—Life imprisonment in Folsom penitentiary was the sentence meted out this afternoon by Superior Judge Willis to W. C. Rogers for having robbed W. T. Reid, a diamond broker, of thousands of dollars worth of precious stones after Reid had been terribly beaten. Rogers and another man, who has not been apprehended, robbed Reid in broad daylight in a downtown office building.

EUROPEAN WAR SCARE STARTED
