

HUCKLEBERRIES ARE PLENTIFUL

Many Campers Leave for Favorite Spots Throughout Timber Belt—Deer Season Will Open August 1—All Are Ready for the Hunt.

Already the campers who make it a practice to spend their vacation on Huckleberry mountain, west of Crater lake, are beginning to prepare to hike for this great resort.

Word comes from the big huckleberry patch that the big luscious fellows will be plentiful this year as usual. Several different parties have had occasion to make a trip into this big berry orchard and all of these declare the berries are going to be not only plentiful but whoppers. While they are yet not more than half grown they will begin to ripen soon after the 1st of August in the more open places and by the middle of the month they may be found in great profusion over the many miles of territory about Huckleberry mountain.

While it is declared by many that the camping season is opening very slowly and later than usual but this order of things is expected to be reversed within a few more days when thousands will hie for the shady nooks of the hills and fishing in the streams. A number have already gone out but not as many as at this time last year. It is stated that deer are to be found in large numbers in all of their haunts and as the season opens August 1st the woods will probably be full of hunters and campers by that date.

SIX MILLION INCREASE IN POSTOFFICE PAYROLL

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 25.—Increased salaries for postal employees made during the current year reached an aggregate of \$6,000,000 today when Postmaster General Hitchcock ordered advances of about \$2,000,000 a year in the pay of post-office clerks and city letter carriers, and of about \$175,000 for railway mail employees.

Increases for rural mail carriers totalling \$4,000,000 a year became effective July 1.

STRAWBERRY CROP YIELDED \$120,000

Hood River Sent Out 54,000 Crates, Filling Nearly 90 Carloads—Revenue Proves of Great Assistance to Northern Fruit Center.

HOOD RIVER, Ore., July 25.—The first fruit to be shipped from the Hood River Valley in a commercial way were the strawberries, and no sooner had this fruit reached the outside market, than Hood River became famous. This season has been no exception. Nearly 90 carloads have been shipped from Hood River this year, totalling about 54,000 crates. They will return to the growers approximately \$120,000. The berry industry is destined to diminish in Hood River in view of the fact that the maturing orchards are crowding the berries out. The plants are usually set the first year that the young apple trees are set, and when the trees reach the age of five years the berry plants are no longer profitable and are plowed out, never to be reset in the same orchard. The acreage for next year will be fully as great as this, however.

LOGGING CAMP NEAR ALBANY IS DESTROYED

ALBANY, Ore., July 25.—Fire which started in logging camp No. 9 of the Curtiss Lumber company, caused the destruction of the plant and buildings last night according to word received here today. The loss will be in excess of \$40,000. It is reported that a forest fire is doing considerable damage between the forks of the Satsium river, near Mill City.

FUR SEAL TREATY WITH JAPAN IS RATIFIED

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 25.—The senate this afternoon ratified the fur seal treaty recently negotiated with Great Britain, Japan and Russia. The agreement will prevent pelagic sealing for a period for a period of 15 years after December 15 next.
