

VALLEY CHARMS PORTLAND PARTY

Editor Piper of Oregonian and Senator Malarkey Head Automobile Excursion to Crater Lake—Former Says County Can Build Roads Now.

All delighted with the Rogue River valley and looking forward to the time when they will have orchards of their own here, an automobile party consisting of Mr. and Mrs. Edgar B. Piper, Mr. and Mrs. I. N. Fleishner, State Senator and Mrs. Dan Malarkey, and Mr. and Mrs. Oskar Huber arrived from Portland Tuesday and left for Crater lake Wednesday morning, escorted hither by Mr. and Mrs. John D. Olwell. From Crater lake they go via Klamath Falls and Bend to Hood River and thence to Portland, though Mr. and Mrs. Fleishner will return for a day or two's fishing in the Rogue. The party left Portland Sunday.

All of the party are prominent in the social and civic life of the metropolis. Mr. Piper is managing editor of the Oregonian, Mr. Fleishner is proprietor of the wholesale mercantile establishment of Fleishner, Meyer & Co. Mr. Malarkey is one of the ablest lawyers and most eloquent orators of Oregon, is state senator from Multnomah county, prominent in politics, author of the Malarkey bill for the control of public utilities, and mentioned as candidate for the United States senate. Mr. Huber is manager of the Barber Asphalt company.

The visitors were taken on a tour of the orchard district by Mr. Olwell and all expressed themselves as charmed with the valley and enamored of the life of the orchardist. The growth and progress of Medford surprised all and in all members of the party, both city and valley have enthusiastic boosters.

Mr. Piper predicted that more and more interest would be taken in this section by Portland people, and that considerable Portland capital would find its way here. He thought a special session of the legislature unnecessary to secure good roads and thought the county abundantly authorized to call a special election and proceed with road construction.

TWO TALENT BUILDINGS BURN

A fire which caused a loss of about \$2500 was experienced by Talent at an early hour Tuesday morning. Two buildings burned but their contents were saved. A hard fight was made to prevent the flames from spreading but a rapid response by the bucket brigade held the flames in check.
