BUILD ROADS WITH WARRANTS.

SECTION 10 of article XI of the state constitution of Oregon, as amended last November by the people, reads as follows:

"No county shall create any debts or liabilities which shall singly or in the aggregate exceed the sum of five thousand dollars, except to suppress insurrection or repel invasion, or to build permanent roads within the county, but debts for permanent roads shall be incurred only on approval of a majority of those voting on the question."

It is evident then that if Jackson county is to continue its good roads construction beyond the levy provisions, that the county court must call a special election and submit the question to the people. If a majority of those voting sanction the indebtedness, the county court can proceed with the construction.

Nothing is said in the constitution as to what form this indebtedness should take. It will have to be in one of two forms—bonds or warrants. Lawyers disagree as to power of the county, without a legislative act, to make a bond issue. There is, however, no question as to the power of issuing warrants, and as the legality of these warrants cannot be questioned, having been issued in conformance to the will of the majority under the constitutional provision, they will find a ready sale at par. Later, when the technicalities of the law have been completed, the warrants can be redeemed with a bond issue, if desired.

It is difficult for the layman to understand why the county cannot issue road bonds. Good roads advocates supposed that they had solved the problem when they amended the constitution. But it seems they only started the work. Cheap peanut politics prevented the legislature from enacting the desired legislation. Bills passed in the closing hours of the session were so conflicting that good roads advocates requested the governor's veto.

It is not as yet known whether the governor will call a special session of the legislature to pass road laws. Nor is it known how general will be the demand that he call such a session. The progressive sections will ask it, the mossback regions oppose it. In all probability the number of petitions received will influence the governor.

In case the special session is called, nothing toward road work can be accomplished this year, as by the time the session is over the working season will have gone by. But Jackson county can continue its road program without waiting for needed legislation and secure miles of roads before winter by calling a special election of its own and authorizing the issuance of warrants—and this should be done at once.

In such manner can Jackson county cut the Gordian knot that binds the hands of road progress, thereby securing for the people miles of highway and a coast-wide reputation for progress.

LAYS BLAME UPON MOTHER

Buelah Binford Tells Story of Her Life—Mother Too Busy to Care for Her or Reveal Things a Girl Should Know.

RICHMOND, Va., 26.—Declaring she wanted no bail and was willing to remain in jail until she has been freed of all suspicion in connection with the murder of Henry C. L. Beattie's wife, Buelah Binford today told the story of her life.

"I never knew better," she said. "When a child my mother was too busy to care for me or to reveal the things a young girl should know. When I went wrong, everyone was against me. When I tried to be straight someone would discover me and what I had been and would give me another push down hill. I was ready to die for Harry, but I was thinking of his father and his baby when I said that. Harry had them and a future to live for. I had nothing and nothing in sight."

The girl denied that Beattie, tired of his society wife, wanted her killed in order that he might be free to marry his childhood sweetheart. "Harry is a good fellow, but he knew the kind of a girl I was. I could not expect him to marry me, and never did," she said.

The girl celebrated her 17th birthday yesterday in her cell with a dinner, afterward reading "St. Elmo." She said she did not regret the death of her child, saying that the child was better off dead. The police assert the girl will testify before the grand jury.

New evidence was discovered when an amber sidecomb was found on the road near the scene of the tragedy. The dead woman had dark brown hair and wore tortoise shell side combs. Buelah Binford is a decided blonde and the police profess to see an important point in this fact.
