VICTORY FOR BIG INTERESTS

LaFollette in His Magazine Bitterly Denounces Reciprocity as a Piece of Private Legislation and Not of Benefit to the Ultimate Consumer.

MADISON, Wis., July 28.—Under the caption of "Whose victory?" LaFollette's Magazine today bitterly denounces reciprocity.

"A piece of private legislation, enacted in supine obedience to the presidential mandate" is the magazine's characterization of the bill. The magazine asserts that the measure is worse than "the outrage of the Payne-Aldrich law."

The article continues:

"It's passage is a victory for the railroads, which may gain increased traffic as Canadian wheat flour to our mills and agriculture implements, motor cars and other manufactures go from our mills to the farms and homes of Canada. The millers are given free access to the wheat schedules of Canada and are handed a club with which to beat down the prices which the American farmer received for his grain. It is a victory for the big industrial and transportation interests, Mr. Ultimate Consumer not a victory for you."

EUGENE FAVORS EXTRA SESSION FOR GOOD ROADS

EUGENE, Or., July 27.—The Eugene Commercial Club has gone on record as favoring the bonding of counties for road work and has passed a resolution calling upon Governor West to convene a special session of the legislature for the sole purpose of passing such legislation as shall put into effect the amendment to article II of section 10 of the constitution of the state, authorizing the counties to incur indebtedness for permanent work on the highways, after approval by a majority of those voting on the question.
