Hindu's Victim Dead. CHICAGO, Ill., July 28.—Archie Hunt, one of the eight victims of the murderous fire which M. Hassin, an insane Hindu, poured into a crowd on the streets from a 45 calibre rifle, is dead today as the result of the wounds he received. Following Hunt's death the Hindu was formally charged with murder.

GOT \$25,000 FOR LORIMER VOTE

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 27.—Testifying before the senate Lorimer investigating committee here today, H. D. Holtzlaw, son of the State Senator D. W. Holtzlaw of Illinois, who confessed to having been bribed to vote for Lorimer, presented evidence that his father's confession was correct. The younger Holtzlaw, who produced the original deposit slip, dated June 16, 1909, showing that his father on that date deposited \$2,500 in the state bank at Chicago. This was the date on which the elder Holtzlaw declared he received the Lorimer bribe. D. W. Holtzlaw, the confessed receiver of Lorimer cash, and had been summoned to appear before the committee but had been unable to do so on account of illness. Young Holtzlaw declared that he had discussed the Lorimer affair with his father several times after the latter confessed and his father said he thought it his duty to tell the truth.
