

RATE HEARING PORTLAND SOON

Commissioner Lane Will Hold Session September 4 to Take Further Testimony Concerning Rates From California to Southern Oregon

Interstate Commerce Commissioner Lane will hold a session in Portland September 4 to take further testimony concerning the freight rates from California points to southern Oregon and Willamette valley under the new long and short haul section of the interstate commerce act.

This matter came up in Washington, D. C., last April when the Southern Pacific company petitioned to permanently continue the present rates. The petition was protested and the commission suspended the granting of the application. The other applications involving rates on the Atlantic coast line and Pere Marquette railroad argued the same day, which were not protested, have been allowed.

No doubt the importance of this investigation will be fully appreciated by all the communities affected. A favorable readjustment of these particular rates means as much and perhaps more to the future development of western Oregon than the recent decision of the commission on transcontinental rates. Five years publicity work would not equal the advantages which will follow a favorable disposal of these cases.

Much intricate work is essential to properly prepare for this hearing and the time is very short. Unless concerted and systematic support is at once given to the proposition, the best results cannot be obtained.

DEER AT FT. KLAMATH ARE MUCH TOO TAME

FORT KLAMATH, July 31.—Game Warden Alva Lewis is requested to make a special trip to the Burns & Utter sawmill, on the Crater lake road six miles above here, to take care of a bunch of deer that are declared to be getting so tame the workmen have to chase them out of the way before they dare fall a tree or saw timber to keep from killing them.

Charles Brophy, the cook at the mill, declares that he has had to run them away from the cook house with shouts before he dares walk outside in the early morning as one big buck has become so familiar that he threatened to take the cook on his horns and walk off with him. He says if the game warden does not care for these deer or the open season hit the country pretty soon there is going to be something doing pretty soon as he does not care to be assaulted and will use force in protecting himself. The deer have also invaded the cook's truck garden and almost devoured it and Mr. Brophy is getting quite desperate.

STOCKYARDS ARE SOON TO BE MOVED

The stockyards are soon to be moved from their present location to the Pacific & Eastern junction. The work of moving the pens and chutes would have been commenced several months ago had it been possible for the railroad company to have determined upon an adequate water supply. The new location is outside the city limits and water supply from the city pipes cannot be guaranteed and the company has decided to put down a well.

TOOK SPLENDID LAKE PICTURE

Bakowski Had Climbed to Top of Eagle Crak to Secure Panorama View and It is Said to Be Best One as Yet.

KLAMATH FALLS, July 31.—J. W. Stephenson, the friend of B. B. Bakowski, who is now believed to be at the bottom of Crater Lake as the lost man's body could not be found after an exhaustive search, was showing the panoramic view of Crater Lake taken by the dead man last fall that is pronounced by all to be the best ever secured of this great natural wonder.

This picture is nearly four feet in length. It was taken from the top of the crags known as Eagle Crest, east of where the road reaches the rim. It was taken from such a high elevation that it shows the water on the opposite side of Wizard island, something not before seen in a picture of the lake. In addition to this it magnifies the picture until every tree and object on the island shows up clearly and one can look down into the crater in the top of the island which is believed to have been the top of the monster mountain that settled down in the center following the blowing out of the sides in the earthquake that caused this wonderful crater.

This picture was taken from a point on the bluff that is not only difficult to reach but is several hundred feet above the rest of the surrounding rim. It is Mr. Stephenson's belief that Bakowski lost his life in trying to reach this same spot when the snow was several feet deep last winter in order to get a repetition of the view in winter time. In trying to make this point where the water would show over the top of Wizard island the photographer was unable to see the many dangerous places on the surface and tumbled to his death and a watery grave down nearly 2000 feet into the lake. With him also went his cameras as he had both of these with him when he attempted to climb the bluff.

Ordinance declaring the cost of the improvement of West Second street from the bluff to West Union Street and assessing the property benefits thereto and declaring such assessment and directing the entry thereof in the docket of city Bens.

Section 1.
