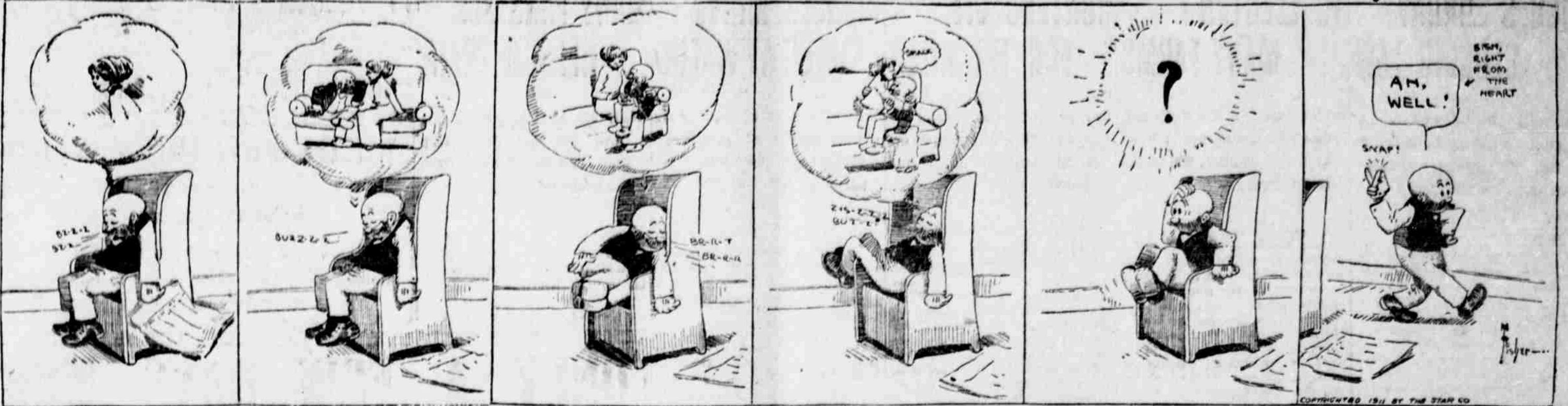

THRIPS HURTING CALIFORNIA PEARS

The California Fruit distributors under date of July 29 say: The following gives number of cars of deciduous fruit shipped from all points in California for the week (7 days) ending Friday morning, July 28th, 1911. Pears: 157 1-2 cars. Shipments are now increasing and will continue to do so for the next week or ten days. Early Crawfords are nearly finished. The crop proved unexpectedly light. Very few straight cars have gone forward. Elbertas are being shipped in a small way and will be in good supply from the first of the week. The bulk of the peaches from California will be moved within the next twenty days. Fruit is of fine quality and satisfactory in every respect. Pears: 237 3-4 cars: This week's output is probably as large and perhaps larger, than it will be at any other time during the season. The quality of the fruit is steadily improving and is now as good as can be expected. The greater portion is coming from the Sacramento river, but shipment has begun from Red Bluff and Sulston. The former reports a good crop, but Sulston will ship only about one-third of her usual quantity.

LIBERAL OFFERINGS CATTLE LAST WEEK

PORTLAND, Ore., July 31.—Receipts for the past week have been as follows: cattle 1915; calves 288; hogs 562; sheep 5077 and horses 33. While receipts in cattle were comparatively liberal no choice stuff was offered with the exception of two or three cars of cows and heifers. This preponderance of thin and half finished stuff makes for a slower market as much of it has to be disposed of for feeding and grazing purposes. Demand is good for fat, smooth steers and cows, as buyers are always ready and willing to pay the price for that class of stock. The real market is steady to strong with tops at \$7.25 to \$7.50 for light well finished calves. Bulls are selling from 3 to 3.60 and stags from 4 to 5 cents. The hog market continues to advance, best swine weighing around 200 pounds, now selling for \$7.65 while smooth heavy hogs bring as high as 7 cents. Supply inadequate to the demand. The sheep market showed unexpected strength when Mt. Adams lambs brought \$5.75 with lighter offerings, bringing from \$5.05 to 5.35. A large bunch of wethers sold for \$3.35. Ewes all the way from \$2.50 to 3 cents for the best grades.
