BARNEBURG TO BUILD ANNEX

Will Give Toggery Bill 25x140 Location—Annex Will Be Two Stories in Height—Front to Be Remodeled and Improved.

Excavation was commenced this morning for the erection of a sixty foot, two story annex at the rear of the Barneburg building one door west from the Medford National bank.

This is the building to be occupied by W. F. Isaacs with his Toggery store and when completed will give him floor space 25x140 feet, the present building being 80 feet in depth.

The interior will be fitted out with every conceivable modern convenience known to the clothing and haberdasher lines.

AUTO OWNERS LATE WITH LICENSE FEE

Postcard Receipts Will Go Out to Stave Off Arrests for Absence of Tags—Will Be Used to Show Intention to Comply With Law.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 1.—Postcard acknowledgement of receipts for automobile registration are being prepared by Secretary of State Oleott for the benefit of a large number of autoists who failed to get applications in time to have their licenses returned before August 1. These cards will not exempt them from arrest but will have the effect of showing intention. About 3000 autos are registered at present but it is estimated there are fully 5000 in the state. Because of the excessive rush of the eleventh hour applications the office force will be unable to return the licenses at once. Because of the large number of auto owners in the state 50 days from the date of the law taking effect was allowed for registration. Hundreds have not taken advantage of that time.
