PERRY FREED BY TAYLOR

Complaint Filed Against Man for Threatening Pacific & Eastern Is Quashed On Demurrer Filed by Judge W. M. Colvig.

The case of C. P. Perry, who was arrested at Butte Falls Saturday, for an alleged threat to injure the engines of the Pacific & Eastern railroad company, came up for hearing before Judge Glenn O. Taylor at 10 o'clock today and was continued until one o'clock, at which time it was again called.

W. M. Colvig appeared as attorney for the defendant, Perry, and argued at length upon the faulty wording of the complaint and offered a demurrer to proceeding with a trial of the case. The demurrer was sustained by the court and the case was dismissed.

Attorney Cherry, assistant prosecuting attorney, asked permission of the court to prepare a new and amended complaint, which request was refused after the court had heard the evidence upon which the complaint would be based.

Attorney Colvig announced to the court that his client, Perry, would prepare and file a complaint alleging assault upon him by F. F. Boltz. The complaint had not been filed at two o'clock.

Boltz is the man who swore to the complaint against Perry.

FOREST FIRE BREAKS AWAY

Stiff Breeze Carries Flames Beyond Control of Fire Fighters—Appeal Sent to City for Large Force of Men to Help in Battle.

SAN BERNARDINO, Cal., Aug. 2.—Fanned by a stiff breeze, the forest fire on San Bernardino range, sweeping aside the feeble efforts of the fire fighters, crossed the divide today and headed toward the Mojave river and desert, leaving a multitude of blackened stumps and smoldering ruins in its path. Where it will end is problematical, although it is now believed that only the water of the river and the desert sand, where there is nothing to burn will check it.

In response to an appeal for aid to this city, a big force of men is en route to help head off the flames, and according to telephone messages, those already on the ground have succeeded partially in doing this. Reports from all sections of the fire zone are less encouraging today than they have been on any day since the fire started. The eastern fire so far has been confined to Little Bear valley and it was believed to be under control until the wind rose this morning, when the fire fighters began to lose ground and unless the wind dies down, the report said, the fire will soon again be running full blast.

WAR IMMINENT IN PORTUGAL

Many People of Wealth Flee Country—Brutal Outrages Have Been Perpetrated On Persons Thought to Be Manuel's Friends.

BADAJOS, Spain, Aug. 2.—Terrified by the prospect of civil war, so many people of wealth and positions are fleeing from Portugal smuggling their money out of the country that national financial embarrassment is threatened.

The flights are due to fear of the Carbonarios, the secret society which engineered the revolution and is still politically supreme throughout Portugal. Angered by recent activity on the part of the monarchists, the members of the organization have perpetrated a series of brutal outrages on large numbers of persons either known to be or suspected of being of monarchist sympathies.
