INDUSTRIAL ARMY TO ATTACK CITIES

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 3.—Unless they are granted their "rights" to speak in the streets, an army of Industrial Workers of the World, will attack Walla Walla, Odessa and North Yakima as soon as the harvest is ended, according to M. Dezellet, an organizer of that organization today.

"We are in earnest in our nationwide campaign for free speech" said Dezellet, "and an army of fully 10,000 Industrialists will march against these three towns after harvest unless persecution of our members stops. Two Industrialists recently were locked up at Walla Walla on trumped up charges because they made street addresses. We have been denied the right to speak in North Yakima and Odessa.

"These instances of abuse of our members have greatly embittered adherents of the organization in the northwest and it is their intention to resent such persecution."
