GOLD HILL MINER STRUCK BY A ROCK

GOLD HILL, Or., Aug. 15.—James Anderson, working in a shaft at the Grey Eagle mine six miles from here, on Sardinia creek, was hit on the head by a rock falling from a beam above, where it had been lodged by a blast hours before, and suffered a severe scalp wound. It was at first thought that his skull was fractured. He was rushed to the Gold Hill hospital in Superintendent Stevens' auto, where Dr. Kelsey found it necessary to take several stitches to close the cut in the scalp. Anderson, who seems unlucky, had three ribs broken at the same mine last summer, and about 10 days ago cut a gash in his hand which had just permitted him to return to work yesterday.
