FOREST BOARD TO MEET HERE

The state board of Forestry has accepted an invitation of the Medford Commercial Club to meet in Medford in October to discuss the matter of forest fire prevention with the owners of timber in Southern Oregon.

State Forester Elliott advised Secretary Boos that he would be in Medford the board would meet here during October.

When the state board is in session in this city it is planned to have all of the owners of timber and as many

of the citizens of the city as are interested in forest fire prevention present. Methods of fighting fire and the prevention of fires will be discussed. The state board will be assisted in its discussions while in session in this city by the officials of the Crater National forest.
