

ASTOR GRILLED FOR ENGAGEMENT

Priest Says 47 Year Old Divorced Multi-millionaire Should Be Ashamed of Alliance With 18 Year Old Maid—Free Love Legalized.

NEW YORK, Aug. 8.—"John Jacob Astor should be strung up. Speaking as a man and a priest, I brand his proposed marriage to Miss Madeline Force as a crime against nature, as well as against society."

Denouncing the divorced millionaire in unmeasured terms, the Rev. Father Evans, of St. Andrew's Roman Catholic Church, was today but one of the New York divines who protested strongly against the marriage of the 47 year old divorced man to 18 year old Madeline Force, a match which has stirred fashionable society to its depths and may cause a serious schism in the Episcopal church.

Legalized Free Love. "Such a marriage is only legalized free love," Father Evans continued. "The Astor case is a particularly flagrant disregard of social and human decency. For this man, recently divorced because of unfaithfulness, to marry a child younger than his own son is a crime."

Whether Astor's wealth and position will prove sufficient to procure for him the permission of a council of Episcopal bishops to re-weave the burning question in society and church circles here. The whole future of the Episcopal church may hinge on the decision. Dr. Chalmers Richmond of St. John's church, Philadelphia, insists that he will place every church man on record on the case.

Bishop Burch on Affairs. Bishop Suffragan Charles Burch, of the Episcopal diocese of New York, while very conservative in his discussion of the Astor case, admitted that the question of his being permitted to re-marry is momentous. He recited the known facts—that Astor's wife was given the divorce; that the millionaire was forbidden to re-marry, and that infidelity is the only ground for divorce in New York.

Bishop Burch said that any divorced person must appear before a council of the bishops and fully prove that he or she was the innocent party to the legal separation. Until this is done no Episcopal minister can marry them. He declared that published strictures by Dr. Richmond were most intemperate, but admitted that the Philadelphia divine had voiced to a great extent the feeling toward Astor's re-marriage which is held throughout the Episcopal church.

PLANS FOR SUBWAY UNDER MARKET STREET

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 8.—Plans for a \$3,800,000 subway to be constructed under a long stretch of Market street were filed with the board of supervisors here today by John Pierce Hill, a civil engineer, who was connected with the construction of the subway in Boston.

Hill stated that the city could reimburse itself by charging street car companies an annual rental of 2 per cent over and above the interest charges on the bond issue. He also stated that a syndicate of five San Francisco capitalists stood ready to carry the enterprise through if the city would not.

JIMMY DURKIN GETS MORE FREE ADVERTISING

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 8.—Declaring the entire northwest was anxious to greet the enemy of benzene of soda, "Jimmy" Durkin of Spokane today wired Dr. Harvey W. Wiley to come to Seattle at his expense, stating in his telegram that he had deposited \$1000 in a Seattle bank to guarantee the expenses of Wiley's trip.

The pure food man, after writing a regretful declination of the invitation wired the bank to return Durkin's money.

CASHIER HIRED MAN TO BLOW UP THE SAFE

JERSEY CITY, N. J., Aug. 8.—Samuel Brown, cashier of the Long Deck company today, confessed to the police that he had hired Frank Walsh to blow up the company's safe in order to destroy the books and conceal Brown's defalcations.

Walsh, unfamiliar with the explosive qualities of nitro glycerine, used enough to blow up half a dozen safes and was so injured about the face and eyes by the explosive that he later died in the hospital.

FIFTY TRAMP STEAMERS TIED UP BY STRIKE

NEW YORK, Aug. 8.—There is a possibility that 50 British tramp steamers in port here may be tied up on account of strike ordered by the Sailors' and Firemen's Union of Great Britain. The crews on tramps usually sign for the journey each way and instructions have been received by the unionists to refuse to sign for return journeys except under the new wage scale just issued. It will not be possible to secure American sailors to man the ships because the American union prohibits its members from stepping into the strikers' places.

PATIENTS STARVED BY FAST CURE

Many Witnesses Anxious to Testify Against Woman Specialist Under Arrest for Murder Accused of Having Killed Englishwoman.

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 8.—British Vice Consul C. E. Lucian Agassiz went to Seattle today to confer with Attorney Frank H. Kelley and Prosecutor Stevenson relative to the prosecution of "Doctor" Linda Burfield Hazzard, fast cure practitioner. Dr. Hazzard is under arrest at Port Orchard charged with murder in connection with the death of Clara Williamson, an Englishwoman, while under treatment at the woman physician's sanitarium at Olalla last spring.

Before leaving the city consul Agassiz said he had received profers of assistance in the investigation of the case from persons in Tacoma, who assert they are victims of Dr. Hazzard's alleged "starvation" methods. One woman whose name is withheld for the present, told the British Consul representative that her husband had been a patient of the fast-cure specialist and had stopped treatment before he became too weak to do so. Many other former patients of the woman are coming to light daily and all express a desire to assist in the prosecution.

Civil actions in addition to the criminal proceedings will be started, according to Agassiz, who stated today that he would file suit for \$25,000 damages against Dr. Hazzard and a Seattle firm of undertakers as co-defendants, for alleged desecration of the dead body of Clara Williamson. Attorneys representing Mrs. Hazzard have notified Prosecuting Attorney Stevenson of Kitsap County that arrangements have been made to file a bond this afternoon for the release of Mrs. Hazzard.
