J. O'Gara asking for information regarding blight which he says is prevalent in that fruit district. Mr. Johnson writes:

I arrived here four days ago. The blight here in this valley is scattering and unless immediate steps are taken it will, beyond any doubt, cause much damage.

I therefore take the liberty of writing you, asking you if you would be so kind as to send me your bulletin covering the subject and any additional information you wish to give me about it.

Racing and various sports will be offered as a drawing card.
