

NELSON GOES TO MOTHERS FUNERAL

Battler Goes Home to Illinois Hoping to Reach Home in Time for Funeral of Parent Killed by Flying Train as She Alighted at Depot.

Canceled all fight engagements, Battling Nelson left hurriedly for Sedgewick, Ill., Friday morning in an effort to reach his home in time to attend the funeral of his mother, who was killed yesterday afternoon by a flying train.

The Battler had made arrangements for a go with Bud Anderson at Klamath Falls and was later to jump to San Francisco and take on Jimmy Britt, but the death of his mother has put a sudden end to all of his plans.

"After I reach home I may jump to New York," stated Batt this morning, "and there arrange to meet Britt in a 10-round contest. However, I am uncertain as to my future plans."

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 11.—Struck by a flying train at the Burnham railroad station, Mrs. Ida Nelson, is dead today at the little home on the farm near Burnside which the "Durable Dane" presented to his parents several years ago. The accident occurred when Mrs. Nelson alighted from a suburban train almost directly in the path of the speeding flyer.

CITRUS GROWERS ARE FIGHTING FOR LIFE

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 11.—Hundreds of telegrams protesting against the proposed reduction of the tariff lemons are pouring in today on members of congress. The protests, signed by residents of Los Angeles and southern California, are being sent in what the citrus growers term a "fight for life." Should the bars be let down, the lemon men assert, the pauper-raised lemons of the Mediterranean would completely swamp the American market forcing California lemons, which are of a superior quality, to the wall.

CAFFEINE USED TO STIMULATE PONTIFF

ROME, Aug. 11.—As the result of hypodermic injections of caffeine, Pope Pius' heart is stronger today and his spirits are much higher, according to reports from the Vatican. His general condition shows no marked improvement, although as a result of the operation on his knee, His Holiness suffers less pain.

The use of caffeine indicates that the pope is very weak. This is now his most disquieting symptom.

BURNS DENIES STORY OF PROBING PORTLAND

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 11.—Reports that he will go to Portland to probe the affair of the municipal government there, were today denied by Detective Burns who is on business connected with the Los Angeles Times explosion. Burns said he intends to visit Portland soon, but his visit there was for the purpose of investigating charges made against his Portland detective bureau by a Portland newspaper.

"The police are indirectly involved in the matter," said Burns, "and I will have to probe the department a little, but it is not with the idea that I will punish them as grafters that I will take up the work. My visit is solely in the interest of my detective business."

Burns said he would leave for the north as soon as he is through with his work here.

JAILOR ACCUSED OF HAVING TAKEN BRIBE

PORTLAND, Or., Aug. 11.—Charged with having accepted a bribe of \$100 to release O. A. Richards, a prisoner, before his term had expired, A. S. Briggs, superintendent of the Linton rock pile where city prisoners are worked, was arrested today.

The warrant was sworn to by Chief of Police Slover this forenoon on information furnished by Richards after he had been found on a ranch a few miles from Portland. Richards is now confined in the county jail.

Richards had served one-half of a 90-day sentence for assaulting a woman with a dangerous weapon, when he left the rockpile.

COMMISSION TO GOVERN CITY

Mayor and Acting Mayor to Leave—Emerick, Wortman and Watt Only City Dads Left to Attend to City Business.

The mayor, three councilmen, the recorder, the engineer and the superintendent of the water system will leave at 3 o'clock this afternoon for Fish lake to inspect the city water system. This will leave three councilmen and the street commissioner to run the city and inasmuch as the president of the city council will be among the absentees a commission form of government will probably be devised.

POSTAL SAVINGS BANK IS FULL OF MONEY

BREMERTON, Wash., Aug. 11.—With the postal savings bank here full and the two banks that are the accredited depositories of postal deposits likewise full, Postmaster Gale has telegraphed to Postmaster General Hitchcock for immediate instructions.

At present the banks can carry only \$5000 and \$10,000 postal deposits respectively. They have reached their limits and patrons of the postal bank, which include many enlisted men and officers in the navy yard, are clamoring to deposit more coin with Uncle Sam and the law won't allow it.

SENATORS PIFFLED MAY BLOCK RATIFICATION

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 10.—Opposition in the senate to the arbitration treaties recently signed up by the United States, France and England, may prevent their consideration at the present session of congress, and, in the opinion of several senators, even final ratification.

Several members of the foreign relations committee resent the fact that President Taft did not consult them in his preparation of the agreements. They may block final action.
