BOYS ADRIFT ON OCEAN RESCUED JUST IN TIME

AVALON, Catalina Island, Cal. Aug. 11.—After two days and one night of suffering from thirst and hunger while they drifted helplessly in an open boat, Jack Zaiky and Edward Jackson, youths who ran away from the state reformatory camp at Catalina Island, are back in the fold today, not much the worse for their experience.

When found by searching parties which had been cruising the ocean for them since Wednesday night, the boys were about ready to despair of ever reaching the mainland, which was their goal. The lads are inmates of the Whittier Reform School.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 1.—Masquerading under the name of Curry Kirkland, Dr. Harry Thaw Kirkland nephew of Harry Kendall Thaw, who killed Stanford White in Madison Square Garden, New York, and heir to the Thaw millions under the laws of Scotland, has succeeded for a year and a half in hiding his true identity from the authorities of the state penitentiary here. Kirkland, serving a two-year sentence for appropriating and pawnng his sweet heart's watch for money with which to quench his thirst for drink—thirst which despite his social standing, education and wealth, has made him a wreck and considerable trouble.

Kirkland has admitted his identity. A letter sent to a local newspaper was the means by which his identity was discovered.
