WIFE AND DAUGHTER MURDERED IN WELL

TECUMSEH, Neb., Aug. 16.—Seattle, Portland, San Francisco, Los Angeles and San Diego police will be asked today to locate E. E. Hesse, in connection with the murder of his wife and 17 year old daughter Juanita, whose bodies were recovered today from an old well on the Hesse farm near here today. A coroner's inquest is being held and a murder verdict, with strong evidence pointing toward the husband and father as the slayer is deemed certain.

The two women disappeared about a year ago. Hesse vanished soon afterward. Last summer, postal cards were sent to the young girl's friends here from Denver and Pueblo, signed with her name. The writing was identified, however, as being that of Hesse.

ROUTINE BUSINESS IS TRANSACTED BY COUNCIL

Much routine business was transacted by the city duds Tuesday evening, chief among which was the passing of ordinance declaring the cost of improvements on various streets and the instructing of the city recorder to advertise for bids for the city's share of the work on the Bear creek bridge to be done before the county erects the structure. EAMES TO DIRECT THE MEDFORD BAND

W. A. Eames on Tuesday evening was elected director of the Medford concert band to succeed John Norling, resigned.

Mr. Eames plays a slide trombone in the band. His instrument is the 'cello. Besides being accomplished on these instruments he has composed several pieces, one being heard recently, "The Greater Medford March," which was dedicated to Mrs. H. C. Kentner, president of the Greater Medford Club.

Mr. Eames is a first cousin of Emma Eames, the noted operatic singer; he is also a graduate of the Royal Conservatory of Music at Brussels, Belgium, and was a favorite pupil of the celebrated 'cello, Edward Jacobs, principal of the above conservatory. While at Brussels Mr. Eames was a member of Esaye's famous Symphony orchestra of more than 150 professional musicians, and at one of their concerts he played the Komberg Concerto for 'cello with this large orchestra as his accompanists before King Leopold and family.

ITALIANS IN AMERICA HELPING OUT CAMORRA

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 16.—Local detectives claim to have gathered material which shows Italians in all parts of the country are contributing to the defense fund of the Camorra trial at Viterbo. In following up possible motives for the murder here of Romeo Roseo and the fatal wounding of Antonio Monofito, the police have found that an alleged agent of the dreaded Camorra had been in Vancouver and had got large sums of money from his compatriots. Whether this man was an impostor or not cannot be proved for since the murder last week he has disappeared completely. But one thing is known, and that is that the unfortunate men were carrying a large sum of money, over \$1000 when they were attacked. The injured man has regained consciousness but is as silent as the sphinx and all efforts on the part of the police to get him to name his assailant have failed.
