Three Young Fruit Experts Studying Handling of Pear and Apple Crops in Northwest - Will Report to Eastern Associations.

For the purpose of making a study of the methods of handling and packing deciduous fruits in the northwest, Messrs. Aechter Markell and Davis of Cornell university have arrived in the valley.

The young men are very much taken with the idea of packing and shipping fruit in boxes instead of barrels, and they will recommend to eastern associations that barrels be discarded.

BUILDING FENCE AROUND SHOPS

O'Brien Says It is Being Done to Keep Outsiders Away in Case of Trouble - Hopes That No Trouble Will Come.

PORTLAND, Or., Aug. 19. - Construction of stockades around the carshops of the Oregon-Washington Railroad and Navigation company, part of the Harriman system, began today.

General Manager O'Brien of the Harriman system in the northwest admitted that the big fence was being put up to "keep outsiders away in case of trouble."
