PROTEST MEETING TO BE HELD FOR SHOAF

A Shoaf protest meeting will be held in Medford next Sunday night. It will be at the Smith hall, beginning at 8 o'clock, and will be addressed by several Medford citizens, among whom will be B. R. McCabe, F. W. Cottrell and John Deager.

The protest will be directed to Governor Johnson of California on behalf of George H. Shoaf, whose recent disappearance at Los Angeles has created suspicion of foul play.

Shoaf went to Los Angeles as a correspondent for the Appeal to Reason, and it is believed that he had unearthed evidence favorable to the McNamaras. Friends of the alleged dynamiters and of Shoaf insist that he had evidence which would clear the McNamaras, and that he has either been killed or kidnapped by persons interested in the prosecution.
