

# MAY NOT SEND FOR CUMMINGS

Man Arrested at Sacramento Charged With Statutory Crime May Be Allowed to Go—Complaining Witness at Portland in School.

Bert Cummings, wanted in this city for a statutory crime, who was arrested at Sacramento Thursday, may not be brought back to Medford for trial. District Attorney Mulkey, with whom the final decision rests, is at Monmouth, O., but it is believed that he will not have the ban brought back, owing to the fact that the complaining witness in the case is now at Portland, an inmate of the institution conducted by the Boys' and Girls' Aid society.

Cummings was wanted for a statutory offense. His victim is said to be the 14-year-old daughter of Mrs. Mick Spanos of this city. Mrs. Spanos was formerly Mrs. Hanscome. An effort to get in touch with the district attorney has so far failed.

# NO ARRESTS FOR BURNING NEGRO

Officers Take No Steps to Punish Ringleaders of Mob Which Tears Negro From Jail and Burns Him to Death.

PURCELL, Okla., Aug. 25.—No arrests are expected here today of the members of a mob which burned Peter Carter, a negro, for an assault upon Mrs. Minnie Spraggins, which is likely to cause her death.

Under Sheriff Farris and Deputy Sheriff Hayes, who were locked in the courthouse when they attempted to protect the negro, are taking no steps to punish the men who took the prisoner from them because practically the entire population of 3000 had a hand in the burning.

Feeling runs high. Everybody is discussing the crime, which was the most brutal ever recorded here. After beating Mrs. Spraggins down with a gaspipe, Carter attacked her and placed a mattress over the body, which he fired. The woman's husband came home just in time to rescue her.

# ILLNESS ROBS HIM OF REASON

James K. Darnell, Who Has Been Ill for More Than Eight Years Will Probably Be Sent to State Asylum at Salem.

Owing to continued ill health which has extended over the past eight years, James K. Darnell, who resides at the east end of Fourteenth street, will probably be sent to the state asylum for the insane at Salem as he is said to have completely lost his reason and his family fear that he will injure himself unless properly safeguarded.

Mr. Darnell has been ill for many years, most of the time being at the very threshold of death. Yet at times he seems to rally to a considerable extent. Recently he has lost his reason and this has led his family to take the necessary legal steps to have him sent to the asylum.
