that the president will be helped by that fact.

President Taft will personally attack the progressives on their own battleground. He will leave here for Washington September 15. The itinerary as laid out provides for his return to the capital on October 31.

Itinerary of Trip.

President Taft's tentative itinerary includes stops at Syracuse, N. Y., on September 16, and at Erie, Pa., September 17. He will then go into Michigan for four days and make a subsequent journey through Illinois and Missouri. Eleven days will be spent in Kansas, Nebraska and Iowa before going back to Missouri.

Next stops will be made at Denver, with a visit into Wyoming. He will visit Utah on the way to California for a stay of several days.

The California trip will take him as far south as San Diego. Leaving California for the north, he will go back to Washington by traveling along the border, spending two days in Washington before speaking in Chicago, and then going into Ohio.

The cities where the president will speak include Detroit, Chicago, Kansas City, Oklahoma City, Denver, Cheyenne, Salt Lake, Los Angeles, San Diego, San Francisco, Sacramento, Portland, Tacoma, Seattle, St. Paul, Minneapolis and Pittsburg.

HOPE FOR PEACE FROM CONFERENCE

Members of Southern Pacific Shop Employees Federation Expect to Meet Kruttschnitt Today and Reach Understanding.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 28.—The members of the Federation of Shop Employees of the Harriman lines are looking forward to a meeting with Kruttschnitt, who is in San Francisco today, which will result in recognition of the federation. The meeting is expected to be held in this city next Thursday or Friday.

President Reguin of the federation today said that he had no doubt that Kruttschnitt would receive the delegation of presidents of the crafts unions involved in the present shop controversy.

"Kruttschnitt has the reputation of being a man of his word," said Reguin, "and if he has said, as he is quoted, that he is willing to meet anyone to discuss the matter, we will have no further trouble. I believe that the federation will be recognized and dealt with directly. If the presidents of the crafts federations do not come here, our advisory board of the federation will meet Kruttschnitt."

"The men up and down the coast are now willing to await the result of this conference and I believe that the danger of the strike is largely past. Of course, should Mr. Kruttschnitt refuse finally to deal with the federation, the men in the shops all over the Harriman system would undoubtedly take measures to protect themselves."

day on which he disappeared Shoaf had a consultation with Alex Irvine, the socialist lecturer. He declared that he had secured some very valuable information and had valuable papers in his possession. The results of his investigation, he told Irvine, were of the most sensational sort.

From 7 o'clock until 9:30 o'clock Sunday night he was at the home of his cousin, Mrs. H. O. Gable. Upon leaving he told Mrs. Gable that he was going to take some important papers from his room because he feared that they might be stolen.

That was the last seen of him. About midnight Mrs. Norman, his landlady, was startled by the sound of a falling body. On investigation she found nothing. Early Monday morning Shoaf's hat, badly battered up, and a piece of weighted hose was found in the hallway of the Gable home. The hose was about 14 inches in length, weighted with shot or some heavy material. It was evidently intended for a Billy.

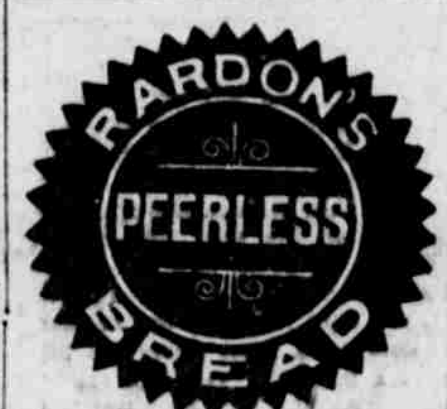
