NEW RATINGS APPLE SHOW

Quality Ratings, Based on American Pomological Society's Scoring List, Abolished for Spokane Display—Sweepstakes on Pack Only.

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 30.—Trustees of the National apple show, incorporated, at their first meeting this year abolished quality ratings on all competitive displays entered at the fourth annual exposition in Spokane, November 23 to 30, thus placing all standard commercial varieties and the district in which they are produced on an equal footing.

Quality ratings, based on the American Pomological society's scoring list, applied only to carload entries at the first three shows, but the fact that this list did not give western apples the consideration to which they are entitled caused some dissatisfaction in several districts.

"We think the greatest problem has been solved by abolishing the quality ratings at the 1911 show," said E. F. Cartier Van Dassel, who has been identified with the show since its inception, "and we believe the growers in all parts of the country will be glad to learn of the action of the management of the show. We always felt that some western apples had been handicapped in the past, but we were not in position to make any changes until this year. Now that this question has been settled, I look for entries from all parts of the United States and Canada, particularly the western country."
