SHOAF'S FATHER WORKING ON CASE

States That Pinkerton's Absolutely Refuse to Work on the Case—Shoaf, Sr., Has Made Little Progress on the Case.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 29.—Captain George C. Shoaf, father of the missing socialist newspaper man, who came to Los Angeles a few days ago to investigate his son's strange disappearance, said today that the Pinkerton detective agency had absolutely refused to work on the case. The offer of a large reward for the location of Shoaf or the detection of the party responsible for his disappearance, he said, could not influence the Pinkertons to take up the search.

According to Captain Shoaf, the reason for the action of the Pinkertons was because of Shoaf's activity during the Moyer-Haywood-Pettibone trial in Idaho. It has been said that the young newspaper correspondent did some excellent private detective work and the elder Shoaf claims exposed the methods of the Pinkerton detective agency.

The work of Captain Shoaf, who is the head of the San Antonio, Tex., detective bureau, since arriving in Los Angeles has availed little, nor have the efforts of the private detectives working on the case brought to light any clue that looks at the present time as though the mystery would be unraveled.
