

GRIGNON MUST FACE A JURY

Justice of the Peace Taylor Holds Accused Man to Await Action of Grand Jury—Suspected of Robbing A. S. Kibby.

Ralph Grignon, accused of being one of the four things who slugged and robbed A. S. Kibby, an aged knife grinder, on last Thursday evening, was held to await examination by the grand jury by Justice of the Peace G. O. Taylor this morning. The hearing was lengthy and the evidence, while circumstantial, seemed strong enough to warrant holding the young man. Bond was placed at \$500.

A large number of witnesses were called to the stand during the progress of the case, among them being A. L. Duffy who swore that he saw Grignon running away from the scene of the holdup. Kibby was unable to testify against the young man other than to say that one of the robbers was short, about as tall as Grignon.

As the grand jury is now in session it is probable that Grignon will be given an early examination.
