MANY MINERS FLOCKING HERE

Prospectors From Many Districts Here to Hunt Hills for Gold—Strikes Reported in the Blue Ledge District.

More mining men are in southern Oregon nowadays than in many years. Prospectors from the Nevada, Spokane and British Columbia districts are numerous, and while investors are not in great evidence, the skilled locators are busy with a sprinkling of the developers.

Sam Rogers, mayor of Elleen capital of Blue Ledge country, brought some fine samples of ore from recent strikes in that celebrated district to Medford Thursday. He is doing the assessment work on the Elleen group, owned by Dr. J. F. Reddy and others, and is showing some fine sulphide ores just uncovered.

A strike is also reported in the St. Albans group, owned by Henry Callahan of Spokane. The ore is rich in copper and gold.

Two miners are doing assessment work at the Edwards claim on Silver Fork, and a good lead has been uncovered.

Supt. Carnahan of the Blue Ledge is also a Medford visitor and reports more prospectors in the country than for years.

METHODISTS INSULTED BREWERS RECOGNITION

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 31.—A strongly worded resolution, voicing the protest of 200 Methodist Episcopal ministers attending the Columbia River conference here against "official recognition by the government of the international brewers' congress" was forwarded to President Taft. The resolution declares that the recognition of Secretary James Wilson as honorary president of the brewers would be a "gratuitous insult to the organized Protestant Christianity of our country," and Taft is urged to use his influence and authority to prevent this shameful prostitution of the dignity and authority of one of the nation's highest officials.

MAN COMPLETELY LOSES REASON

J. T. Doran Is Confined in City Jail Until Attendant Arrives From Insane Asylum—Has Been Ill With Pneumonia.

Under the hallucination that he has baffled eighteen Greeks in their effort to electrocute him in order that they might secure a mythical \$1400 he won in an imaginary Eagle Point poker game, J. T. Doran, an electrician of this city is covering in his cell in the city jail today begging the police to protect him from the vengeance at the hands of the Greek's compatriots. Doran imagines with each opening of the door of the jail that they have come for him. The one who will come, and on tomorrow's train will be an attendant from the state asylum for the insane, for Doran is completely crazed, and shows it in every movement and word.

Doran is a highly educated electrical engineer and has written several books on the subject. For some time he has been ill with pneumonia and but recently arose from his bed. Wednesday afternoon he went violently insane and was locked up. After an examination this morning he was committed to the asylum.

Doran now harbors the delusion that he baffled eighteen Greeks last night when they attempted to electrocute him. In an elaborate statement to the chief of police this morning he told of his cunning in turning the current upon the Greeks and in his discourse he gave evidence of his knowledge of electricity. According to attending physicians he will probably regain his mind when his physical condition improves.
