EAST FLOODED WITH FRUIT

Ruinous Prices for Pears and Other Products Due to Large Local Crop and Unsettled Financial Conditions Throughout Country.

The Northwestern Fruit Exchange under date of August 29 says: The exchange has been issuing market reports up to this time about once a week, as the northwestern states have not been shipping regularly until recently. Hereafter, reports will be issued several times weekly, and as soon as required, reports will be issued daily.

The table hereunder will give an excellent idea of the course of the market since last report. Bartlett pears have been selling at ruinously low prices as will be noted; other varieties of deciduous fruits have been selling at disappointing prices. These conditions are attributed to the heavy supplies of early apples, pears and plums which the eastern districts have been putting into the market, and to the generally unsatisfactory business, industrial and financial conditions now prevalent throughout the country.

The exchange quotes extracts from letters received from private sale and f. o. b. markets, which throw light on the viewpoint of the buyers in the fruit trade: Burlington, Iowa, letter dated August 25th: "I am very much afraid you are going to be disappointed with the business of my territory until late this fall, owing to the fact that there is a large local crop of apples and at the present time our dealers are selling apples themselves. Our local crop of pears is very good; only thing the trade are buying is oranges."

From Omaha: "Market on pears bad." Californians \$1.00 f. o. b. Colorado Bartlett's \$1.40 delivered, this price shaded 5 to 10 cents when necessary. Large crop of eastern pears shipped in barrels, selling 10 to 65 cents f. o. b. and the best stock I have ever seen. Market on apples unusually low as home grown, best we have had for years, and practically free from worms, early varieties, selling for 50 cents bushel for the best, while inferior stock selling for 30 cents in the market. Grapes plentiful with heavy crops in Michigan and New York."

The exchange agent at Seattle today, in response to a telegram offering a car of pears from Washington, wires: "Cannot get offer. Bartlett's

10-INCH GAFF TO CATCH FISH

Sandry Shows Iron Hooks With Clotheslines Attached Used at Grants Pass—Justice of Peace Appeals to Governor for Pardon.

Fish Warden Sam Sandry was in town yesterday displaying two gaff hooks taken away from Grants Pass fishermen. They are of 3-8-inch iron, 10 inches long and 2 3/4 inches in width at hook. Clotheslines were attached.

The violators were taken before Justice James Holman who apologized for having to fine them the minimum amount, then suspended sentence pending an appeal by him to Governor West for a pardon.

In an interview in the Rogue River Courthouse, Justice Holman discusses his reluctance to obey the law and the appeal to the governor and the comments it aroused, as follows:

"I suppose the Medford paper is mad because I did not put a boy and a destitute man in jail to lay out a fine of \$50. I had imposed, thereby causing suffering to an innocent family. Pending an appeal to Governor West the man is on parole under a \$50 fine. He is now working and earning bread for his family. He reported to me today, and is to report again in ten days. By that time it is expected that we will hear from Governor West. If the governor refuses the pardon, then the sentence will be carried out. Now the heathen may rage. I guess the city of Grants Pass is able to conduct its courts without instructions from the town in the Bear creek brush."

County School Superintendent Predicts Splendid Year in Jackson County Schools—Open for the Most Part Next Monday.

With everything arranged for their reception Young America as far as Jackson county is concerned, will walk into their respective school rooms next Monday morning and settle down for eight long months of acquiring knowledge. All of the schools are ready for the children and nearly every school in the county will open Monday although there are a few which will delay the opening day for two weeks.

"I am expecting a splendid year for results along school lines" states School Superintendent J. Percy Wells "for everything is in readiness this year and I believe we have the best corps of teachers ever engaged throughout the county."

"I am expecting big results from the new system of supervising the schools. The county is now divided into three districts. G. W. Ager with headquarters at Talent takes charge of one district, D. C. JANETOS TO BE TRIED ASSAULT

Grand Jury Returns True Bill Against Creek Who Shot Man in Railroad Camp Near Butte Falls—Victim Recovers.

Peter Janetos must face trial next week in the circuit court on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon for shooting Peter Ruchlas in the railroad construction camp near Butte Falls two months ago. The grand jury returned an indictment Thursday afternoon against the Greek after the testimony of a large number of Greeks was examined. Fourteen witnesses in all were subpoenaed.

Only the fact that Ruchlas recovered after a hard fight saved Janetos from facing trial on a more severe charge. As Ruchlas is now out of all danger the only charge left to bring against Janetos was assault with a deadly weapon. The case will be tried early next week.
