

TALK OF PLANS FOR NEW BRIDGE

Business Men and Officials Meet in Conference But Do Not Come to Any Decision—Meet in Jacksonville Soon.

A number of business men met with members of the county court and the city council in the office of the mayor Friday afternoon and Saturday morning and discussed the matter of the new bridge to be constructed over Bear creek in detail. It was decided that the city council should meet with the county court Wednesday or Thursday and there come to some understanding in regard to the bridge.

Some time ago the county and city called for bids for the construction of the bridge over the creek but as the bid received was too high, in the estimation of the county court, for the work on which an estimate of \$30,000 had been placed, the bid being \$35,000 the bid was rejected. To call for new bids would have been the proper way in which to proceed but it was feared that this would delay the actual construction of the bridge until too late to complete it this season. For the purpose of arriving at some determination in the matter interested property owners and members of the council and court met Friday. Nothing was determined and will not be until the men meet next Wednesday or Thursday at Jacksonville.

Beezer Bros. submitted to the meeting Friday plans for a different structure over Bear creek which they claim can be built for less money and be a more convenient and slightly structure. Nothing definite was decided upon in regard to these plans but they are creating a more or less favorable impression.

There is a move on foot to have Ralph Modjeski come here and go over the plans for the bridge. Mr. Modjeski is a noted bridge engineer. Wednesday or Thursday the entire matter will be thrashed out and a future course of action decided upon.

HIGH PRICE FOR LOCAL FRUIT

Three Cars of Extra Fancy Spitzenbergs Are Sold f. o. b. Medford at \$2.25—Record for Fruit Districts of Northwest.

The Northwestern Fruit Exchange announces the opening of the apple selling season of 1911, and reports the following sales, which it has made through one of its resident salesmen in a distant market.

These sales need neither eulogy or comment—they speak for themselves.

For account of the Rogue River Fruit and Produce association, Medford, Oregon: Two cars Jonathans, about half each extra fancy and choice; extra fancy at \$1.85 f. o. b. Medford. Three cars extra fancy Spitzenbergs, 4-tier at \$2.25 per box, 4 1-2-tier at \$2 per box, f. o. b. Medford. Five cars extra fancy Yellow Newtown Pippins at \$2.10 per box, f. o. b. Medford.

Pursuant to a policy of protection of its membership, the exchange withholds the name of the purchaser and the name of the city in which this order has been booked. Manager Miller of the local association withholds the name. The exchange believes that these prices will probably prove to be the record for the entire northwest, for five or more cars, for the season of 1911, regardless of dis-

trict producing the fruit. It chanced that the Rogue River Fruit and Produce association had some of its fruit on exhibition in this city in which this sale was made, last year, and the quality, grade and pack made such a profound impression that when this block of fruit was offered our resident salesman was able to command an extremely fancy price.
