SECRET SERVICE FOR MEXICO

Detective in Los Angeles to Organize for De La Barra Greatest Spy System in the World to Crush Future Rebellions.

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 5.—Acting under orders from President De La Barra, Bernardino DeGarcia, the most successful detective in Mexico, is in Los Angeles today to organize for his country what he says will be the greatest secret service system in the world. According to Garcia, the duty of this organization will be to crush all future Mexican rebellions in their infancy. Several Los Angeles sleuths already have joined his forces.

The Mexican government will depend upon brains, not force of arms, to crush out future uprisings, said Garcia today. "We will not place our faith in a mighty standing army and a powerful display of arms, but we will organize a secret police which will make the successful carrying out of revolutionary plots impossible. Mexico intends to spend millions in the perfection of its secret service and our ranks will be recruited from the best men in San Francisco, Denver, Chicago, Philadelphia, New York, Baltimore and Washington."

KRUSE FLED TO DODGE DOWNFALL

PORTLAND, Or., Sept. 5.—After checking over the accounts of her missing husband, Theodore Kruse, who disappeared August 21, Mrs. Kruse today declared that she believed Kruse fled because he did not want to witness his own financial downfall.

The accounts show that he was confronted with bills payable on September 1 amounting to \$76,500, while his cash assets totaled approximately \$30,000.

Kruse is the owner of the Louvre cafe and Belvidere hotel and the Ritz Carlton hotel.

BROKEN HEART KILLS CONVICTED LAND SWINDLER

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Sept. 5.—Friends here of Bartlett Richards, who died yesterday in a penitentiary at Rochester, Minn., following a sentence of a year's imprisonment for conspiracy to secure government land through dummy entries, today attribute his death to a broken heart.

No man, his friends say, ever felt so keenly or showed his inner feelings more plainly than did Richards over his accusation, arrest, trial conviction, sentence and servitude.

Richards for many years was a resident of Los Angeles and at the time of his arrest was considered one of the richest stockmen in Wyoming.

SHOT WIFE WHO ASKED HIM TO WIPE DISHES

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 5.—The report that he dry the supper dishes is attributed today as the cause of the quarrel which led Harry H. Rouse, 35, assistant secretary of the Los Angeles Abstract and Trust company, to kill his wife and then end his own life with a bullet through the heart.

The shooting occurred but a few feet from where the couple's 4-year-old son was playing on the floor. The Rouses had just finished supper and Mrs. Rouse asked her husband to assist with the dishes. In reply he drew a revolver and fired point blank at her. The bullet went wild and lodged in the kitchen wall. Placing the barrel of the gun to his head, Rouse pulled the trigger.

Rouse came here about eight years ago from Colorado Springs.
