SOCIETY COUPLE ADRIFT AT SEA THREE DAYS

PORTSMOUTH, N. H., Sept. 6.—Adrift at sea in a small catboat for three days, Miss Elise Henderson and Thomas Dennison of Dover, well known society people, who were picked up by the yacht Robroy after the petticoat flying from an improvised mast of the catboat had been recognized as a signal of distress today told a story of hardship and terror.

The couple were blown out of the harbor by a sudden squall which dismasted the boat and left them helplessly adrift. Lacking food and water, they became weak and terror-stricken. When rescued the girl was in an unconscious condition and Dennison was raving deliriously.

M'INTOSH ENTERS PLEA OF GUILTY

Will Be Sentenced by Judge Calkins Thursday Morning—Has Paid \$20 in Accordance With Order of Justice Taylor.

J. A. McIntosh, indicted by the grand jury Tuesday afternoon for failing to support his wife and children, appeared Wednesday morning in the circuit court and pleaded guilty. He will be sentenced by Judge Calkins Thursday morning at 9 o'clock.

In all probability McIntosh will be ordered by the court to contribute a certain amount regularly for the support of his family, and should he fail in this the court can order him to be put at work on the county roads at \$1.50 a day, which will be paid the family for their support.

In accordance with a decree of Justice Taylor, before whom the case was first called, McIntosh has paid his wife \$20 toward her support. He has also made over an order on the Carnegie library board for \$300 due for services as architect, which is now in the hands of Judge Calkins. This will probably be used for the support of the family.

It is charged that McIntosh neglected his wife and children to such an extent that they were practically destitute. This led to the complaint being filed in the justice court. A transcript of the case in this court was filed by Justice Taylor with the circuit court. The grand jury also took up the case and returned a true bill.
