

SLAP AT TAFT BY COLORADO

Direct Legislation League of Centennial State Committed to Submission of Constitutional Amendment Providing Recall of Officials.

DENVER, Col., Sept. 6.—Striking direct at President Taft in answer to his veto of the recall of judges in Arizona, the Direct Legislation League of Colorado today is committed to the submission of a constitutional amendment providing that the Arizona plan shall be law in Colorado.

The decision of the league was reached here last night at a stormy meeting, the vote on the proposition, after acrimonious debate, standing 31 to 21. The amendment provides for the recall of any official including judges, on petition of 25 per cent of the voters.

Friends of President Taft in the league meeting fought hard to amend the plan so that the recall might be invoked only in case of malfeasance in office or other high crimes and misdemeanors, for violation of antielection pledges or for conduct unbecoming an officer of the law. This effort was defeated, the plan which states no grounds for the recall winning out after one speaker had declared: "It is high time defiance should be issued to the interests and for Taft's presumption in defeating the wishes of the people of Arizona."



At the regular meeting of the city council Tuesday evening, the following routine business was transacted: Bills were allowed for August and warrants ordered drawn.

Eleventh from Oakdale to Central avenue.

CLASSY RACING AT PORTLAND TRACK

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 6.—Fourteen of the classiest pacers of the west will get away at the Country Club track this afternoon, contesting for the \$6500 purse, hung up by the Portland Fair and Livestock Association.

Among them will be Hal McKinney, 2:08 1-2; Nordwell, 2:08 1-2; Teddy Bear, 2:05; Don Pronto, 2:05 1-2, and Junior Dan Patch, 2:10 1-4.

The \$10,000 stake event, the 2:12 trot, is scheduled for Thursday, King Brook, 2:07 1-2, winner of the \$10,000 trot at Sacramento last week, is already here to participate in the event. The gelding is owned by W. I. Higgins of Deer Lodge, Mont. Among the other entrants are Bernice R., owned by M. C. Keefe of Woodland, Cal.; Bonaday, a Hood River horse and Dan McKinney, which is entered by Joe McGuire of Denver.

TO MAKE DIVORCE IN SEATTLE MORE DIFFICULT

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 6.—Aroused by the constantly growing figures of divorce decrees granted in King county during recent months, judges of the superior court of King county have agreed to adopt every expedient within the provisions of the law that may make divorce more difficult.

A large proportion of the cases are brought by spouses who have been married only a few months, and another large proportion comprises cases that amount to little more than ordinary family disagreements. Hereafter divorce cases will not be heard unless it is shown that the parties have been married at least one year.

1143 STUDENTS ARE ENROLLED

Increase Expected Before End of Week—Big Gain Over One Year Ago When Total Enrollment Was But 1013.

The total registration of pupils in the Medford schools Tuesday, the first day of the new term, was 1143. This is the greatest number of pupils ever to register on an initial day in the local schools. According to former years, the registration always increased after school opened, so it is safe to predict that Medford will have over 1200 pupils this year.

According to the figures handed Superintendent Collins Tuesday afternoon, the high school has a total enrollment of 225. Last year the enrollment of that school was but 151.

The total enrollment in the schools has increased to 1143 from 1013. With the pupils who will enroll today it is believed that the total enrollment will be over 1200.
