APPLES BRING GOOD PRICES

Northwestern Exchange Secures Good Sales in Advance by Keeping Out of Auction Markets in Big Eastern Centers.

The Northwestern Fruit Exchange reports the following sales of apples: For account of Cashmere (Wash.) Fruit Growers' Union: One car, half each Spitzenbergs and Winesaps, as follows: Spitzenbergs, extra fancy, \$2.25. Fancy, \$2.00. 'C' grade, \$1.50. Winesaps extras, \$2.00. Fancies, \$1.75. 'C' grade, \$1.25; f. o. b. Cashmere.

Two cars genuine Winesaps, 75-80 per cent extra fancy, at \$2.00. Fancy at \$1.75. 'C' grade, \$1.25; f. o. b. Cashmere. Two cars Arkansas Black 85 per cent extra fancy, balance standard, at \$1.90 straight, f. o. b. Payette. Two cars Winesaps, 75 per cent extra fancy, balance standard, at \$1.90 straight, f. o. b. Payette. One car Jonathans, extra fancy, at \$1.60 straight, f. o. b. Payette. Up to this time the exchange has booked orders for a total of forty-nine cars of apples which have been sold to buyers in twenty-three different markets. With the season just starting, this seems to promise a distributive showing for the season of 1911 far surpassing last year's remarkable showing. Only one car of the entire number booked so far, has been sold to go to a city east of the Mississippi river, and not a single car has been placed with buyers in any of the large markets—New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Chicago.

The market continues well supplied with both pears and prunes. Eastern speculators, who contracted earlier in the season, are reported to have made exceptionally heavy losses in both pears and prunes from the north west. Reports from the exchange offices in the east, on file in this office, show Bartlett pears to be selling at auction all the way from 55c to \$1.60 delivered. Italian prunes opened up at disappointingly low prices in the east, are bringing 85c to \$1.10 delivered. Fortunately, the exchange has kept out of these markets, has worked the small markets, farthest removed from the zone of auction-market influence, and in consequence has been able to get from \$1.00 to \$1.50 per box, f. o. b. shipping point, for Bartlett pears and has booked a lot of orders from the same small markets for Italian prunes, at 75c to 70c f. o. b. shipping point, according to dates of booking and dates of shipment.
