

MISS NOBODY FROM STARLAND

Most Sensational Novelty of Season Booked as Next Show at Medford Theatre—Is Musical Comedy That Has Made a Hit.

The most sensational novelty of the theatrical season in Chicago was the big dress rehearsal scene which Mr. H. Singer introduced into "Miss Nobody from Starland," his latest musical comedy production at the Princess theatre, which will come to the Medford theatre on Friday, September 15. Mr. Singer literally takes his audiences out of their seats back on the stage and shows them how a big production looks from the other side of the footlights. Although there is a riotous spirit of travesty all through the scene making it a continuous series of laughs, one following the other at lightning speed, the scene has opened the eyes of the public to some of the accidents and disadvantages against which the manager has to contend when he stages a production worth thousands of dollars.

The Miss Nobody in "Miss Nobody from Starland" is a chorus girl who, when the show opens, is engaged with a gambling brother in the risky enterprise of smuggling a few diamonds into the United States. The scene is aboard the ocean liner, Lusitania, and there is a hoard of detectives, led by the great Pierce of Scotland Yard, on the track of the smugglers.

Then there is Preston Halliday, son of Frederic Halliday, the millionaire manufacturer of Halliday's Hair Restorer. Preston had trouble with his father over in England and hired out as a drug clerk. By mistake gave a customer arsenic instead of essence of peppermint for stomach ache. After discovering his error, he flees, thinking he has murdered the man. On the Lusitania he is suspected as a smuggler by Pierce and is accused of "the crime." Thinking the detective means the suspected murder Preston confesses. But the detective thinks Preston is the brother of Miss Nobody, whom Pierce loves. And old man Halliday, who is aboard, also falls in love with Miss Nobody, the chorus girl. Preston himself tries to flirt with her.

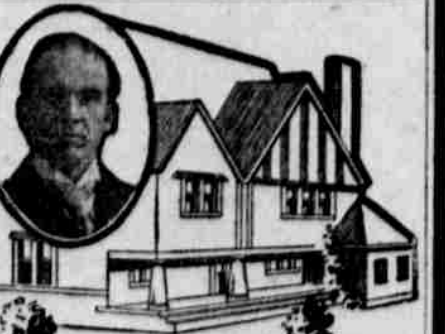
