

# BIG GOOD ROADS MEET AT ASHLAND

Local Club Will Be Well Represented at Big Meeting to Be Held in Neighboring City Next Friday Evening.

In response to an invitation from the Ashland Commercial club a large number of good roads boosters will leave Friday evening for Ashland, where they will attend a good roads meeting of the Ashland club in an effort to get a broader understanding of the means and purposes of the bond issue of \$1,500,000 with which to provide Jackson county with a modern system of highways.

The matter came before the Commercial club at its regular meeting Wednesday evening and when a call for volunteers was made by President Colvig a large number of the business men responded and will attend the meeting in the neighboring city.

Dr. Caldwell of Ashland was present at the meeting of the local club last evening and briefly outlined the sentiment as it prevails at Ashland. He urged the local men to come to Ashland and meet with the Ashlanders, stating that a discussion of the bond issue would lead to a broader understanding of the matter and consequently to a greater support of the move.

Good roads were discussed at some length by the club, many members speaking on the subject. As a final outcome it was voted to appropriate \$200 and appoint a committee to undertake the work of educating the public in regard to the bond issue.

At the meeting to be held at Ashland Friday evening all of the towns in the valley will be asked to send delegations so that it will really take the nature of a huge mass meeting. The matter of entertaining Governor West and Samuel Hill, who will be here September 20, has been placed in the hands of a committee of five, consisting of Dr. J. F. Reddy, George Putnam, A. E. Reames, W. H. Canon and John D. Qwell.

## BIG LEAGUES THROW GAFF INTO MINORS

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 7.—Declaring that the minor leagues have had the gaff thrown into them so long that they expect nothing but it, Manager Danny Long of the San Francisco club in the Pacific Coast league today characterized as a joke the action of the national baseball commission in suspending for one year the rule which forbids any major league club asking for waivers on purchased minor league players previous to December 1 of the year following the purchase.

"It's the same old story, the same annual suspension," said Long. "It's nothing more than a joke. The eastern clubs are allowed to gobble up every unattached player in sight, despite the fact that the rule says 40 players shall be the limit of the reserve list."

## YACHT WIGWAM WINS BUT SINKS AFTER RACE

ASTORIA Ore., Sept. 6.—Her rudder lost, the Wigwam II sank a few feet beyond the finish line, a lap ahead of the Astor, in the third heat of the 32 footers in the centennial regatta today. ## CLUB SUPPORTS TRAFFIC BUREAU

Commercial Club After Discussion Passes Resolutions Urging That Initiative Be Used to Secure Equitable Rates.

The Medford Commercial club adopted resolutions at a meeting held Wednesday evening supporting the Medford Traffic bureau in its efforts to secure equitable freight rates throughout the state of Oregon through the initiative, but only after President Colvig of the club had bitterly opposed the passage of the resolution. The meeting was well attended and greatly enjoyed inasmuch as it was lively from start to finish.

As soon as the resolution came before the club President Colvig asked chair. Then he attacked the resolution, saying that he had never heard of a more idiotic thing. During his discourse Colvig attacked the Oregon system and also the men who are at Dr. Pickel, vice-president, to take the head of the local traffic bureau. But his address was not enough to stem the tide after H. C. Garnett, E. A. Welsh and George Putnam had spoken briefly in regard to the matter and explained that it was within the province of the club to take the matter up, as it was for the best interests of Medford.

The resolutions adopted are the same as those drawn by the Medford Traffic bureau some time ago and provide for the drawing and submitting of an initiative bill to the people of the state at large a law fixing and establishing a uniform maximum distance class rate schedule applicable to all sections, and to railroads according to their classification as first-class, second-class, etc. It is believed that this will end the discrimination against the outside cities of the state in favor of the metropolis.

Today sunshine and warmth, small offering and up she went. Car of Washington (not frats) averaged \$4.50; best California made \$1.75 to \$2, ripe \$1.25 to \$1.60, with some in bar order \$1.00. Cold storage box Bartlett's are not keeping well. No sale until next Tuesday, when this market will be almost bare and we look for higher prices on good Bartlett's.

Yesterday, worst day of the season, fearful rainstorm, absolutely impossible to sell through the streets, buyers' stores full of fruits and six cars were pulled out of the sale. Today beautiful weather, small offering and every buyer helped the advance. New York recovers from depression quicker than any market in this country.

## PINCHOT CHARMED WITH ALASKA

Conservationist and Poindexter Examining Resources of Northland—Delighted With Country and People—Will Not Return for Congress.

COROVIA, Alaska, Sept. 7.—Gifford Pinchot, former chief forester and Senator Miles Poindexter of Washington, arrived here yesterday to begin their examination of Alaska's resources. They were welcomed by Mayor Lathrop.

E. E. Swergal, representing General Manager Hawkins of the Morgan-Guggenheim interests, was an early caller and presented the visitors with elaborate maps of the coal regions and railroads. Senator Poindexter said: "I am delighted with Alaska. I endorse the scenery and what I have seen of the climate, without reservation. The weather so far is equal to California."

Pinchot said: "I endorse not only the scenery but the splendid people of Alaska so far as I have had the pleasure of meeting them." The party will proceed at once to Seward, thence to the Matanuska coal fields to join the Holmes geological survey party. They will visit Controller Bay and the Bering river coal fields. They will not attempt to return in time for the conservation congress at Kansas City, but will remain to make a very thorough examination of the Alaskan situation.
