MUST PAY HIS WIFE \$15 WEEK

Judge Calkins Suspends Sentence in McIntosh Case Provided Man Pays So Much a Week for Family's Support.

J. A. McIntosh must pay \$15 a week to the clerk of Jackson county henceforth for the support of Mrs. McIntosh and family. Judge Calkins issued an order to that effect Thursday morning, suspending sentence for one year. Should McIntosh fail to make such payment he will be sentenced to jail, the judge ordered him.

McIntosh was arrested some days ago, charged with failure to provide for his wife and family. He pleaded guilty to the charge Wednesday and this morning appeared for sentence. Believing it would work a hardship on the family if McIntosh was sentenced to jail, the judge ordered him instead to contribute each week to the support of the family.

MAN ACCIDENTALLY HANGED; SAVED

Hunter Who Tied Himself in Tree Falls and Is Found by Wood Hauler Just in Time to Save Life—Was Watching for Deer.

Word has come to Medford that a hunter and wood hauler figured as principals in a narrowly averted tragedy in the mountains of Griffin Creek last week. A well known wood hauler of that locality was driving up one of the rocky canyons of the district early in the morning preparatory to loading his wagon with wood for the Medford market, when to his surprise he saw a gun and hat lying under a tree on the mountain side. On closer inspection the wood hauler found a man hanging face downward in the tree above the hat and gun. He arrived just in time, as the hunter was purple in the face and near death's door. With great difficulty the rescuer lifted the unfortunate hunter to an upright position and held him there for an hour or more until he regained sufficient consciousness to be helped down from the tree. The man, while watching for deer with a rope around his waist to prevent falling had been overtaken by a fainting weakness and lost his balance. But for the opportune arrival of the wood hauler the hunter's death would have been the certain result.

No names are mentioned in the story, which has drifted down from the hill, evidently for fear of the game warden.

GERMAN AVIATORS KILLED IN MID-AIR

STRASSBURG, Germany, Sept. 7.—Aviators Lieutenant Neumann and Leconte, the latter carried as a passenger, were instantly killed at Bihelms today when the motor of their aeroplane exploded at a height of 100 feet and men and machine, enveloped in a sheet of flame, were dashed to the ground. Both men were crushed beneath the motor.

Paul Senge, an amateur aviator, while making a trial flight at Karlsruhe, fell and was picked up in an unconscious condition with a fractured skull.

TO FROM LOCAL U. OF O. ALUMNI

Many Prominent Men of the Valley Are Eligible to Membership—Ashland May Be Included in the Association.

Plans are being made for the getting together of the alumni and former students of the University of Oregon into a Medford alumni association. Among the Medford men eligible to membership in the proposed organization are W. I. Vawter, president of the Jackson County Bank, W. H. Gore, president of the Medford National Bank, Engineer J. W. Roberts, the builder of Medford's \$500,000 water system who is at present in Olympia, Olen Arnspiger, city engineer of Medford, Dr. Thayer, physician and surgeon, George Dunn, a large land owner near Medford, John Gore, owner of the famous Gore pear orchard, Blain Klum, the advertising man, "Dusty" Rhodes, and Arthur M. Geary.

The members of the University of Oregon alumni in many of the other towns of Oregon have had alumni associations for years and the alumni in Medford have been contemplating one for some time. Among the purposes of the organization will be the maintaining of prospective students and boosting the interests of their alma mater in general. It is quite possible the fellow alumni in Ashland will be asked into the organization. There are very large number of graduates of the state university in Ashland, among whom are numbered many of the most prominent men of the town.

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 7.—Judge Chesebro today overruled the demurrer of Harrison Gray Otis, Harry E. Andrews and R. M. Whitney, Times editors, and they must appear Monday to enter their pleas for trial on charges of printing indecent news.

Judge Chesebro decided that the city ordinance covers more ground than the state law in question and peremptorily ordered the three prisoners to appear in court Monday and file their pleas.

15 YEAR OLD BOY WILL NOT BE HUNG

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Sept. 7.—Country-wide fears that Earl Gilchrist, the 15-year-old negro boy convicted of the murder of another negro lad, would hang, which resulted in Governor Donaghey being deluged under a flood of letters, telegrams and petitions of protest, were declared to be groundless here today.

The case has been appealed to the supreme court and a decision cannot be expected for a month at least. If the upper court sustains the boy's conviction, the governor has declared his intention of commuting the sentence.
