

**APPLES SENT
TO FAR EAST****HIGHER PRICES
FOR BARTLETT'S****FRUIT SHIPMENTS
FROM CALIFORNIA****WEEKS RECEIPTS
AT STOCKYARDS**

Northwestern Exchange Reports Sales Made for Future Delivery Principally in Central West—Better Prices Received.

The Northwestern Fruit Exchange report as follows under date of September 9:

The demand for apples for future delivery has a sluggish tendency and it requires a good deal of persistency and enthusiasm to bring buyers to the point of actual orders. The eastern trade, by which is meant the territory east of the Mississippi, continues to show indisposition to buy ahead, and the sentiment is pessimistic and bearish. What business is being booked for export to the far east—China and Australia. The exchange reports sales as follows: One car extra fancy Idaho Jonathans at \$1.50; one car extra fancy Ganos at \$1.10 f. o. b. Idaho; four cars of Italian prunes at 65 cents f. o. b. Idaho. The exchange is negotiating sale of 20,000 boxes Washington Winesaps for export; mostly 4 1/2 and 5 tiers; 10,000 boxes for October delivery, and 10,000 for November delivery. Extra fancy grade not required, but fruit which will grade to a good fancy. The exchange wants to hear immediately from those of its members in position to supply any part of this order.

The pear market shows signs of cleaning up but prices still rule low. Chicago fifth California Bartletts averaged in auction \$1.19; mixed car from Yakima Bartletts sold (400 boxes) 75¢; car Medford Bartletts sold \$1.40-\$1.50; Minneapolis fifth car of Zillah, Wash., Bartletts averaged \$1.03; Toronto fifth car of Medford, Ore., Bartletts, by Producers' Fruit Co., sold \$1.65 to \$2.30, averaged about \$1.80. On Sept. 1st at Chicago two cars Medford Bartletts sold; one by Producers, \$1.35-1.75, averaged \$1.58. At Cincinnati Sept. 4th, California Bartletts averaged 77¢ on one car, \$1.26 on another.

The exchange has moved a number of cars of Bartlett and other kinds of pears from Cashmere, Wash. One car was sold at \$1.50 f. o. b. Cashmere; others at \$1.25 f. o. b., others at \$1.00 f. o. b. and has not placed a single car of Cashmere Bartletts through the auction this year.

TO FLOAT TORPEDO BOATS SUNK BY RECENT STORM

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 11.—A novel scheme is to be tried by the navy department in floating the five torpedo boats washed ashore at Charleston, S. C., by the recent hurricane. The plan is to pump a powerful stream of water on the beach beneath the stranded vessels and literally wash a channel. This is the only way the department's experts figure that their oars can be refloated as they are forty feet from the shore.
