IS IT TREASON AND ANARCHY?

THE PORTLAND OREGONIAN, in its issue of September 3rd, recounts a conference by the Public Service Commission, of the state of Washington, and the railroad commission of Oregon, continuing "all day and late in the night" in secret session where matters of public concern were secretly discussed and plans formulated and agreement entered into.

According to the Oregonian, quoting Clyde B. Aitchison, chairman of the Oregon railroad commission, the purpose of the conference was "to work out a plan between the railroad and public service commissions of the two states and the representative of the interstate commerce commission in adjusting rates so that no conflict would result either as to jurisdiction or as to rates which might be fixed by the state or federal authorities * * * and yet conserve the manufacturing and shipping interests of the state and at the same time give the consumer the greatest possible protection and liberal treatment." A list of names is inserted of those in attendance, among which are not found any that could be construed to represent either the railroads or the shippers or that undefined individuality, the consumer.

Under a Salem date line of September 8th, the Oregonian says: "With the purpose in view of allowing the Pacific coast manufacturers to compete with the manufacturers in what is known as the Missouri district for the trade in the intermountain country, as well as to place the entire Pacific northwest on an equality as far as distance tariffs are concerned, the interstate commerce commission has been submitted a proposition by the joint commissions of Washington and Oregon with that end in view. It is the plan of the two commissions to iron out, or smooth away, the inequalities in the tariffs for a distance of 600 miles. This would stretch into the intermountain country at least as far as Boise and give the manufacturers on the Pacific coast an even break with manufacturers of the east."

Can it be true that rate regulation has resolved itself into secret conferences whereby whole schedules are to be changed and the public who pay the bills and the carriers who collect them are not to know what this proposition is until it is fastened upon them by these political builders who work in secret? It seems incredible, astonishing!

What does the Oregon commission law say about "investigations and hearings?"

"All hearings shall be open to the public."

What does this law say about the manner of bringing investigations?

That they shall be "upon complaint of any person, or upon motion of the commission."

What is the procedure after complaint or motion is made?

"Before proceeding to make investigation the commission shall give the railroads and the complainant ten days notice of the time and place where and when such matters will be considered and determined, and said parties shall be entitled to be heard * * * any person may appear before the commission and be heard."

What does the law say about keeping a record of these proceedings?

"A full and complete record shall be kept of all proceedings * * * and all testimony shall be taken down by a stenographer," as a public record.

What is the procedure to get before the interstate commerce commission?

A complaint shall be brought by "any person, etc.," after which the commission shall "investigate the matters complained of."

How does the interstate commerce commission arrive at a reasonable rate?

"After a full hearing upon a complaint."

What does the constitution of the United States say of the powers of states?

"No state shall enter into any treaty, alliance or confederation. * * * No state shall, without the consent of congress, enter into any agreement or compact with another state."

What does the Oregon constitution say as regards supporting the constitution?

"Every person elected or appointed under this constitution shall, before entering on the duties thereof, take an oath or affirmation to support the constitution of the United States of this state."

The Oregon commission law says "each of the said commissioners shall also, before entering upon the duties of his office, execute a bond, payable to the state of Oregon, in the penal sum of \$10,000 * * * for the faithful discharge of his duties and office."

If the news articles published by the Oregonian are true, the railroad commission has not faithfully discharged its duties of office. Furthermore this commission has entered into a compact or agreement with another state upon a matter of vital interest to the commonwealth of this state and has submitted its proposition to the interstate commerce commission and invited that body to join in the agreement contrary to the constitution and with no war? rant in law.

The article in the Oregonian says, "The interstate commerce commission will take the matter fully under advisement and will probably confer with the three commissions as to the relation of the proportional tariff" whereby territory is to be parcelled out between Pacific coast jobbers and jobbers at the Missouri river upon a plan worked out in a secret conference, with no complaint before them as provided by law which also provides that all meetings shall be open to the public and a public record made of same."

The state of Oregon has a commission in a state of anarchy against her laws and making agreements and compacts with other states in violation of the federal constitution.

Will the people of Oregon tolerate the setting aside of the laws of the state in this manner?
