ORDINANCE NO. 573.

An ordinance prohibiting the discharge or firing of fireworks and other pyrotechnic displays, and to limit the sale and storage.

The City of Medford doth ordain as follows:

Section 1. The discharge, firing or use of all firecrackers, rockets, torpedoes, Roman candles or other fireworks or substance designed and intended for pyrotechnic display, and of all pistols, carbines, rifles, shot guns and other blank cartridges and cases containing explosive material, is hereby prohibited.

Section 2. No person may order the public display of fireworks or any other pyrotechnic display or show of such character as to be hazardous to surrounding property or endangering persons or persons.

Section 3. The sale of fireworks at retail is prohibited.

Section 4. Permits may be issued only after an inspection of the premises by a chief of the fire department or his authorized agent, and shall be issued by the mayor and fire department a certificate of approval and reasons therefore.

Section 5. Any person firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding Fifty Dollars (\$50.00).

Its direction removes or has removed at the owner's expense and stored of fireworks or other combustibles examined for sale or held in stock in violation of this ordinance, the chief of the fire department shall direct such fire appliances as in his judgment may be necessary for the premises, and he shall see that two or more persons are instructed in the use and as to the best means of getting fire alarms to the fire department.
