## POWER PLANT ALMOST DONE

### Hundred and Fifty Men Rush Work On Prospect Plant In Order To Complete Structure Before Rains Set In—Poles All Up.

The Prospect Construction company is rushing to completion the stupendous undertaking of harnessing the power of the Rogue river, and if the weather conditions are fairly good the power output will be developed before cold weather sets in.

Supt. Cooper has now about 150 men to work finishing up the foundation of the power plant, excavating for pipes, running rock crusher and at other necessary work in connection with the plant.

The flume is rapidly being placed by Contractor Young, the lumber for which is supplied by three saw mills running full capacity.

The poles are all placed and the balance of wire required is expected in from Medford today. The work of building the plant will now be commenced in earnest, in fact has commenced already as some of the foundation is going into place today.

## GOOD PROGRESS BUZZARD MINE

### Three Shifts Working With Air Drill On Applegate's Prospect On Umpqua Divide Above Elk Creek.

The Applegate mine, also known as "The Buzzard," is now working ten men, running three shifts on the air drill and some work from the surface. Manager Donne believes they have the making of a great mine as do many others who have investigated the ground. The tunnel that runs in ore 800 feet shows a great deposit of low grade ore running from \$3.40 to \$4 per ton in the precious metal which in itself would be a paying proposition if sufficient were on hand to handle it. It is the belief of the company however, that much richer ore will soon be uncovered. It is believed to be the intention now to spare no expense at finding higher grade ore.

## ORDINANCE NO. 573.

An ordinance prohibiting the discharge or firing of fireworks and other pyrotechnic display, and to limit their sale and storage.

## CITY NOTICES.

cases, cannons, or other appliances, using blank cartridges or caps containing nitrate of potash mixture, is hereby prohibited. Provided, that the mayor or council may order the public display of fireworks by properly qualified individuals under the direct supervision of experts in the handling of fireworks. Provided also that such display or displays shall be of such character and so located, discharged or fired as in the opinion of the chief of the fire department, shall be hazardous to surrounding property or endanger any person or persons.

Section 2. The sale of fireworks at retail is prohibited.

Section 3. The storage or sale of fireworks at wholesale is prohibited, except by permit from the mayor, issued for a period of one year. Application for permit must be filed with the chief of the fire department at least thirty days previous to the issuing of the permit, and must give detailed description of the proposed care and storage of said materials and of the structural conditions and occupancies of the building.

Section 4. Permits may be issued only by the chief of the fire department or his authorized agent, who shall file with the mayor and fire department a certificate of approval and reasons therefor.

Section 5. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars (\$50.00), at his discretion, remove or have removed, at the owner's expense, all stocks of fireworks or other combustibles exposed for sale or held in stock in violation of this ordinance.

Section 6. The chief of the fire department shall direct such fire appliances as in his judgment may be necessary for the protection and he shall that two or more persons are instructed in their use, and as to the best means of setting fire alarms to the fire department.

Section 7. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.
