













CATTLE MARKET TAKES A DROP

Strong At First Of Week Market Drops Off 10 To 15 Cents-Hogs Half Dollar in Three

PORTLAND, Sept. 18.—Receipts for the week have been: Cattle 2,-106; calves, 237; hogs, 2077; sheep, 8316; goats , 249 and W. and M, 58.

The cattle market opened very strong the first of the wek but with an unusually large run on Friday it dropped off 10 to 15 cents. Top of steer market is considered steady at \$5.50 to \$5.60 for choice beeves. Movement of cattle from Montana has been very heavy. The feature of the week's trade was the sale of 468 well finished steers at \$5.80, when the market was at its best. Butcher eattle also sold unusually well the first half of the week. Spayed helfers were quoted at \$5.00 and choice cows \$4.65 to \$4.75. The market late Saturday was fully 15 cents under this price. There is a good demand for light calves at \$7.50.
