

SEWER SYSTEM IS COMPLETE

Over 45,000 Feet Of Pipe Ranging In Size From 8 To 30 Inches Laid In Little City To The Northward Many Improvements Are Made.

The Central Point sanitary and storm water sewerage system is completed. There have been put in 45,000 feet of pipe ranging in size from 8 to 30 inches and this is laid in the ground at a depth of from 4 to 24 feet and 1400 feet of the excavation required tunneling to lay the pipe. All of this work was done by the Jacobson-Bade company and at a cost of \$84,000 to the town.

In addition to the \$25,000 water system put in by the town last year \$13,000 have been expended this year in extensions. And besides all this the town is expending \$3,000 in paving its main streets.

The entire water and sewerage system was designed by L. W. Osgood, of the firm of Osgood & Cummings of Medford and the construction work was all under his supervision.

JUDGE GROSCUP WILL QUIT SOON

Man Who Set Aside \$29,000,000 Fine Against Standard Oil To Leave Bench October 1—He Is Judge Who Imprisoned Debs.

CHICAGO, Ill., Sept. 19.—Judge Peter Groscup of the United States court of appeals, announced here today his intention to resign on October 1.

Groscup is considered wealthy and has large corporation connections especially with interurban and street railway properties. Since he has been on the bench he has been the object of bitter attack, especially from the labor and socialist press which extended even to his private life. In recent years these attacks have become more fierce.

In the note announcing his resignation there was no intimation that this agitation had influenced his decision.

Judge Groscup was born in Ash-tabula, Ohio, 52 years ago and was appointed to the federal district bench in 1882. His notable decisions were the fining and imprisonment of Eugene V. Debs and his opinion setting aside the fine of \$29,000,000 imposed on the Standard Oil company by Judge K. M. Landis.

ALL CLEWS FAIL IN BANK ROBBERY

Officers At Sea Regarding Men Who Tapped Bank Of Montreal For Greatest Sum Ever Secured From A Safe On Western Hemisphere.

NEW WESTMINSTER, B. C., Sept. 19.—According to P. K. Ahern, superintendent of the Pinkerton Detective Agency at Seattle, and Chief of Police Bradshaw, of this city, there is nothing new to report in the bank robbery case here. The officers are running down every clue that they can find, and they are furnished with a lot of false clues that bother them considerably, but nothing is too trivial to escape their notice. They are carrying on a thorough and systematic search for the robbers and sooner or later they expect to land the men who made the greatest cash haul ever taken from a safe in the western hemisphere.

The theory that the men who pulled off the robbery had been on the coast for some time will not down. It is pointed out that it is too early in the year for the yeggmen of the Atlantic coast and Chicago and Minneapolis to be out here, for these men operate in North and South Dakota and Western Minnesota during the fall months, when the banks of those states have large deposits of funds to buy grain and pay off the threshing crews. The yeggs seldom come to the Pacific coast until they fail there to make a good haul in the northwestern states. Therefore it is reasonable to suppose that the men who robbed the Bank of Montreal of more than a quarter of a million dollars have been on the coast for some time and are members of the gang that tried to rob two banks in Vancouver recently.

MACHINERY IS HERE FOR ROAD

Twohy Brothers Will Rush Grading Of Central Point Road So As To Complete It Before Fall Rains Begin.

Several carloads of machinery for Twohy Bros., have arrived and work will soon be under way in earnest on the Central Point road. The equipment shipped includes every modern device for building a macadam road in a hurry.

The contractors are now entailing a large crusher at the quarry near Jacksonville where they will prepare the rock with which to build the road.

It is expected that the road will be completely macadamized before the fall rains start.

TON OF ORE PROVES RICH

Sterling Gold Quartz Mining And Milling Company's Mine On Sailor Gulch Proves Better As Shafis G. Down.

A ton of ore from the Sterling Gold Quartz Mining and Milling company's mine, on Sailor Gulch, was brought to the Opp mine and crushed yesterday and very satisfactory and flattering results were obtained.

From the ton of ore four ounces of amalgam, half of which was gold, was secured. There were also 125 pounds of concentrates which will run very rich.

The mine, which is located near the famous Sterling placer mine, comprises several well defined lodges of gold bearing quartz. A 700-foot tunnel has been run and the quality of the ore is improving as the tunnel is pushed further in the mountain. As a matter of fact the ore being taken out now is considered far better than was that in the test recently made.

ipal buildings were wrecked in violent rioting which broke out at Suena today, 20 miles from here. The rioters were dispersed by the government troops sent against them.

A general strike has been started in Valencia and the latest reports are that the strike situation throughout the entire kingdom has reached alarming proportions. It is thought that the various strikes foreshadow a concerted effort at revolution on the part of the labor unions.

Valencia is under martial law and the troops occupy the streets here. In a number of places telegraph wires have been cut and other depredations committed. Strikes prevail at Bilbao and Saragossa and are partially successful at Cadiz, Huelva, Seville and Gijon.

It is expected that the workmen at Barcelona, Ferral and Corunna will go out next.

STRIKES OVER SEA HIT STOCKS

NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—The disturbed conditions in Spain and Austria combined with the increase in the German bank rate of discount to 3 per cent were largely responsible for the unsettled condition of the stock market today. Amalgamated Copper and American Smelting declined more than a point and other stocks showed heaviness but under support rallied before noon. Western Union gained a point. Sales in London aggregated 12,000 shares.

The market closed strong. Bonds were steady.

MEMBERS BATTLE IN FREE-FOR-ALL FIGHT

SYDNEY, Australia, Sept. 19.—After an hour's battle during the session last night when four members made a flat onslaught on the speaker of the house and a general riot followed, reserves of police being required to extricate the struggling mass of members on the floor of the house, there is truce today in the legislature. The speaker was badly cut with a heavy book and a score of members suffered bad scalp wounds. The sergeant-at-arms, whose duty it is to arrest whoever makes a disturbance, started in early to quell the riot but was overwhelmed when the opposing forces orirate legislators met in the center of the house. The disturbance came as the climax to several days of obstruction by the opposition and labor party.

SPLIT MAY COME IN ORDER OF ODD FELLOWS

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Sept. 19.—Friction between the governing bodies of the sovereign grand lodge of Odd Fellows and the Patriarchs Militant, the military branch of the order, resulted in the session here today when Grand Sire Cockrum recommended that the office of commander of the Patriarchs Militant be made appointive instead of elective.

Cockrum appointed a committee to consider the question.

Insurgents among the Patriarchs say that an effort of the grand lodge to remove the independent administration of the Patriarchs will cause a serious split in the order.

O'BRIEN WILL INSPECT ROUTE

Leaves With Party Of Officials To Go Over Route Of Proposed Line Between Eugene And Coos Bay. Go By Autos.

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 19.—Accompanied by a party of railroad officials J. P. O'Brien, general manager of the Harriman lines in Oregon, will leave Portland tomorrow for an inspection of the route of the proposed line between Eugene and Coos Bay.

After spending a day investigating at Marshfield, the western terminus, the officials will travel over the right of way to Eugene in wagons and automobiles.

SHIPS HAVE NARROW ESCAPE OFF POINT SUR.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Sept. 19.—Reporting one of the most narrow escapes from marine disaster in his experience, Captain Greene of the American-Hawaiian Steamship company's big freighter Virginian made port here today after brushing against a big passenger steamer in the fog early today off Point Sur. He believes the other vessel was either the Governor or the Yale.

Captain Greene says he heard another ship's fog whistle when the lookout dashed aft, crying that they were about to collide with another vessel. Greene was in the wheel house at the time and threw his helm hard over. The approaching lookout realized his peril at the same time and the other vessel swerved from its course.

FWOYER TESTS HIS AERIAL STEED; IS READY

COLFAX, Cal., Sept. 19.—After half an hour's test of his aeroplane here today, Aviator Fowler declared the machine was again in perfect condition, and stated that he could take to the mountains tonight, but for the non-arrival of his rudder attachment, which was delayed in leaving the eastern factory, and will not arrive until tomorrow night or Thursday, leaving him just nineteen days in which to cross the continent.

TWELVE OVERCOME IN FIERCE CHICAGO BLAZE

CHICAGO, Sept. 19.—Twelve firemen were overcome by smoke here today while fighting a fire in the warehouse of the International Harvester company's plant. They were rescued and carried to the street where they were revived.

HENEY OPPOSED TO PARDON FOR RUEF

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Sept. 19.—Sacramento is buzzing today over a powerful speech by Francis J. Heney on the initiative, referendum and recall, during which Heney declared himself as bitterly opposed to granting a pardon to Abe Ruef, whom he put behind the bars.

Heney did not keep closely to his announced subject but spoke at length on government and history. He scored President Taft for vetoing the Arizona recall and for dismissing Pinchot.

"We must have," he said, "the initiative, referendum and recall to perpetuate to the people the right of self government."
